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# FROM OUR RABBI



In order to understand Conservative Judaism it is essential to examine one of the central themes of Judaism, that being revelation.

"The only thing revealed at revelation was revelation itself."

These are the words of Professor Neil Gillman from the Jewish Theological Seminary. These words have always resonated within me when I think of the actual moments of revelation which occurred at Mount Sinai

We are commanded in Judaism to see ourselves as if we were present at revelation; however, what that actually means is less clear. In this light, I would like to present in this article the different movement's beliefs on revelation, thus allowing each and every one of us to reach our own conclusions. I hope that you find these opinions interesting and embrace the question of revelation, consequently becoming closer to God and the moment that He revealed Himself and the Torah to the Children of Israel.

In order to understand our movements opinions on Revelation and our theological foundations, I will present here a few commentaries of various movements and thinkers concerning this subject.

Rabbi Norman Lann, former president of Yeshiva University in New York, explained the Orthodox position in The Condition of Jewish Belief: The Torah is divine revelation in two ways. It is God given and it is godly. By "God given," I mean that He willed that man abide by His commandments and that that will was communicated in discrete words and letters . . . I accept unapologetically the idea of the verbal revelation of the Torah . . . How God spoke is a mystery; how Moses received this message is an irrelevancy. That God spoke is of the utmost significance.

**Conservative Judaism**, which occupies the centrist position in American Judaism, offers a spectrum of positions regarding God's role in revelation.

Some Conservative theologians, such as the late Rabbi Professor Abraham Joshua Heschel, hold that God revealed the Divine Will at Sinai. Those revelations, however, were transcribed by human beings, which accounts for the wide variety of biblical traditions, and which also accounts for the occasional contradiction of these traditions.

Other Conservative theologians, such as the late Rabbi Ben Zion Bokser, hold <u>that divinely</u> inspired human beings wrote down the Torah.

Still others, such as the late Rabbi Professor Seymour Siegel, believe that the <u>Torah is the human record of the encounter between God and the Jewish people at Sinai.</u> Since is was written by <u>human beings, it contains some laws and ideas that we might reject as anachronistic.</u>

In general, Conservative Judaism sees Torah as constantly evolving, yet rooted in a transcendent reality.


Reconstructionist Judaism was the intellectual child of Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan (1881-1983). Kaplan believed that <u>Judaism was the creation of the Jewish community, influenced by the God who, existing within nature, cannot violate its laws. Kaplan also taught that Torah emerges from the life of the Jewish people.</u>

Finally, there is the approach of contemporary Reform Judaism, expressed in the words of the Reform movement's Centenary Perspective (1976): "Torah results from the relationship between God and the Jewish people." At Sinai, God and the Jewish people met: at Sinai, God entered into a unique relationship with them.

These ideas which I just presented are the main beliefs concerning revelation in Judaism and it is now up to each individual to define for themselves the path that they would like to follow. I personally find myself within our movement's spectrum of belief, and now that we understand where our movement stands on such an important theological issue in comparison to other denominations, we can examine our movements theology in weeks and months ahead.

For example, we have dramatically changed and revamped our ways of communicating with you. This has resulted in considerable savings for the shul due to decreased printing, sorting, and mailing costs over the past three months. I am curious though: have you printed or read the bulletin from the CAS website, or from the weekly CAS email to all members? Have you ever looked at any photos or videos on our CAS website? (www.ahavathsholom.org) Have you ever looked at the Calendar of CAS Activities on the shul website, which is updated daily, and seen all that's going on at the shul? I really do want to hear from you!

We also have conducted a much more robust programming agenda, and we're just getting started in this aspect of synagogue life. Just for this upcoming month of February, we are hosting three outstanding, internationally renown speakers: Dr. Jane Guzman Pawgan(a fellow CAS congregant!) will present "Jews in America" on February 5, AIPAC's Raphael Danziger will present "U.S. Policy in the Middle East" as the Kornbleet Scholar-in-Residence lecture on February 7, and Steve Emerson will screen his new documentary film and sign books on "Jihad in America" about the Muslim Brotherhood on February 26 (hosted by B'nai Brith, Yad b'Yad, Southwest Jewish Congress, and CAS).

This month also includes the raucous festival of Purim, and as always we will "do it up right" at CAS. Rabbi Bloom will conduct an adult education class on "Purim – What's all the Ruckus" on Sunday morning, February 17. Purim will be ushered in on Saturday night, February 23 with a Havdallah service followed by a reading of the Purim Megillah complete with costume party and the annual religious school Original Purim Spiel. The regular Sunday minyan on February 24 will include a full reading of the Purim Megillah with a more "adult tone;" to the extent that "yeah-boo" or "boo-hiss" can be claimed as "adult tone!" At 12:30 after Sunday School, we will join the Federation's Community Purim Carnival which will be held at Temple Beth-El this year. This is an amazing event that gets our

kids interacting with Jewish kids from all over Tarrant County. Many thanks to the Ladies Auxilliary, Mens' Club, and USY for sponsoring fun booths for the kids at this carnival, and to Zoe Stein Pierce and Frances Marks for their great job representing CAS on the Federation Purim Committee.

Sundays are always busy busy busy days at CAS. Regular daily minyans are at 9 am and 6 pm on Sundays. In between is Sunday school at 9:30, Bagel Nosh in the Brachman Lounge also at 9:30, and various committee meetings, work in the GAN CAS Community Garden, and adult education classes.

A number of committees are launching new projects, and need your participation. Watch the weekly emails, weekly Shabbat notes, the monthly bulletin, and the calendar on the website for updates on events and meetings. Please let me know of projects or committee activities that you are interested in, so we can work together to make them happen.

Of course the entire month will be packed with planning and details for the grand 120<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Gala to be held on Saturday night, March 2. Be sure to get your tickets, which are free to members and \$60 for all others. This will truly be a night that will never be forgotten in the storied history of our shul!

Each month we get new members, and each week I see more and more of you joining in our Friday night or Saturday morning Shabbat services. Our Shabbat Kosher Kiddush luncheon continues to be the most-attended program of the week.

# From Our Cantor and Educational Director



Esther: A Heroic Woman Determined to Save Her People By Cantor Shoshana Abrams

As a female cantor, I have always been interested in looking closely at the lives and contributions of female Jewish leaders of our history and tradition. As you probably know, the next major holiday coming up is Purim and on this

holiday we retell the story of one woman's bravery and leadership. It is interesting to note that Esther literally means "hidden." Not only was Esther's identity hidden from the King Ahashverosh for much of the story, God's presence is hidden in the story as well.

In the story of Purim, Esther is appointed Queen, but does not reveal her Jewish identity until Haman threatens to kill all the Jews of Persia. Mordechai, Esther's uncle, notifies her of this news and she steps up and takes a huge risk in order to save her people. At the time, anyone who approached the King without being invited risked being put to death. It did not matter if you were the Queen- the same rules applied. Knowing this, Esther and Mordechai organize a solidarity fast, and Esther approaches the King. Thankfully, the King receives her favorably and eventually she reveals her identity to him. As she does so, she also expresses her desperation for the King to stop Haman from killing her people, the Jewish people of Persia. When the King hears of this he is appalled and hangs Haman. As one can see,

Esther's courage and dedication to her people makes her the greatest heroine of this story. That being said, I believe it is important to recognize Mordechai's effort to notify Esther of Haman's wicked plans to destroy the Jewish people.

This story paints a pretty vivid picture of what it was like for Jews to live in exile at the time. It also sends a pretty strong message that it is possible for Jews to retain their Jewish identity in the exile. It was virtually impossible for women in Persia at that time to hold any power and they were usually marginalized in the community. Even the queen had very little power. The only way a woman could obtain any power was through the manipulation of men in powerful positions. This reminds me of one of my favorite quotations from the movie, My Big Fat Greek Wedding- "The man is the head, but the woman is the neck. And she can turn the head any way she wants." In other words, women could influence the way the men chose to assert their power. Esther broke the standards of her time and rose above the norm in order to defend her people. In general, women as well as Jews of this period did not have any voice. She had two factors working against her, yet she used her internal and external beauty, charm, and intelligence to save the Jewish people. She also took one very big risk- approaching the King without permission.

Clearly, Esther is not only a heroine of her time, but one of the present time because she serves as a role model for Jews living in the diaspora today. She went against all odds and did everything she could to ensure the safety and continuity of her people. From her courage and bravery, we learn that it is possible to secure our Jewish identity even in the diaspora.

#### FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I am a dog lover, but because of our work and play schedule, do not feel that keeping a dog in our home is a good idea. Because of our desire to care for a pet, have been fortunate to have had a number of cats living with us. Currently we have two Abyssinians, a male and a female, that exhibit typical traits of this breed. They almost never vocalize, will follow humans around the

house as they are very curious, will sit in the same room but do not often seek out someone's lap. They will however search for high places to sit or hide, not unusual to find one sitting on the mantle of a fireplace, the top of a bookcase, or perched on the top of the refrigerator. One of our cats will also open cupboard doors and crawl inside, sometimes late at night, pushing out pots and pans. The male portrays the behaviors and actions of an alpha cat. Should the older female decide to sit in a specific location, the male will make her move and claim the spot as his own. When the female selects an alternative location, the male will again claim this location as his. The behavior continues no matter the location. It is a way of saying I'm in charge, or that spot is better than mine.

I have noticed over the past few years that many synagogue attendees exhibit similar behavioral characteristics when in the

synagogue. There is a spot, a seat, a pew location, that has become personal space, and should someone else sit in that specific location, one of two actions occur: The individual may elect to sit somewhere different, or they may sit as close to 'their' spot, slowly moving into that space by making the other person feel uncomfortable, or even requesting that the other person move. If you come to services often, just close your eyes and visualize the chapel, and think of who sits in what location. A number of congregations actually assign seating for High Holy Days, while others allow a congregant to purchase their 'spot' and place a gold or brass name plate on that pew location. Some of us actually permit congregants to sit where ever they want to sit. One's Shabbat seating may be different on Friday night than on Saturday, and the seat preference may actually change from the chapel to the sanctuary. Interestingly, there are those that will arrive early in order to protect their area by placing tallit over the seats, or leaving a tallit bag on a chair. I too prefer one seat in the sanctuary or chapel, but I select one that allows me to move about with as little discomfort to those around me as possible. On occasion, we will have a guest or a perspective congregant attend our service and hopefully, if they select your 'spot', you will sit next to them and make them feel welcome. If you are uncertain as to where you may prefer to sit, try attending a number of our services and sit in various locations until you find the one that fits you the best. If you have a spot that provides that comfort zone, feel free to arrive early so that another does not attempt to exhibit alpha cat behavior.

#### More from Michael Linn
