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FROM OUR RABBI



I received a video from my neighbor in New Jersey showing the wind and snow from the great "bomb cyclone." (New York Post) His message was, "I have an ample supply of food and firewood for the next couple of days," as they were expecting in the first few hours over 8 inches of

snow. This started me thinking about different descriptions of the winter, such as;

A Winter Surprise

The lakes are covered with ice; Our trees are full with frost. It seems as a good nice winter, but one thing, one thing is lost.

~The Snow-The Snow!

The fireplace is a cracklin', the moon is full and bright. The stars are just there twinklin', It seems as a perfect night.

But what is there missing? Maybe the perfect sound? Nothing but the wind gusts, blowing the snow around.

> The fire goes out; the babies start cryin', The wind picks up; I start smilin'.

Could it be?
Finally some snow!?
I looked out the window to see a dimming glow.
I drank my hot chocolate,
which warmed my body.

Then, like a lion, I jumped into bed, and slept.

When the light had shown in, I sprung out of bed. So quick, she heard me, my mom said.

I looked outside, and saw no brown.
The ground was bright!
The ground was white!

Whiter than the whitest of rice, Whiter than the cotton like clouds of the sky.

Maybe, just maybe, winter would be pretty nice!

Judaism always attempts to show us the beauty in life as seen through the multitude of midrashim that connect the here and now with the omnipotent. In other words what we can control and what is in nature.

Snow is not only white but also pure and clean. When studied closely, purity and cleanliness can be seen as two of the central principles of Judaism. In the book of Job we read, "Yet the righteous holds on his way, and he that has clean hands grows stronger and stronger" (Job 17:9). In this verse we see that cleanliness grows from strength to strength. What does it mean to have clean hands? Is it ritual cleanliness, religious cleanliness, being cleansed of sins, perhaps all these things and more? To me, cleanliness encompasses all of these possibilities.

One example of religious cleanliness can be seen through the use of the mikvah during a conversion, before a wedding and at many other times. The immersion into the mikvah signifies a rebirth on one hand of the individual who is entering into Judaism, and a purity for those about to undertake exciting life cycle events. The mikvah is also used by scribes before they write God's name.

The Psalmist teaches us about the purity of God's words in the Book of Psalms: "The words of the Lord are pure words" (Psalms 12:7). What do these pure words mean? Some would say that the Psalmist is referring to the truth behind God's words. I would like to offer another meaning that is relevant to the snowy winter season. I think that the Psalmist was talking about the freshness and newness in which God's words should be understood. Like the snow that brings freshness to the air we breathe, so too are God's words a joy to take in. They are as essential to the Jewish people as oxygen is to all mankind. While the snow has fallen and stuck to the ground, so too have God's words come down to us through the written and oral Torah and stuck to our souls.

In the end, while these words most likely would not placate my friend (I know I would be having a difficult time in such a storm) they are relevant to our daily lives and the outlook upon which we approach God.

May the purity of snow enter our lives while at the same time skipping over Fort Worth.

The Courage That Split The Sea

Picture it. You and your family are Israelites enslaved in Egypt. You toil many hours each day in the hot sun under the brutal taskmasters making bricks out of clay. All you have ever known is slavery, but you hear tales of a time when your people were free

generations ago. One day a stranger named Moses appears and promises you and the rest of the Israelites freedom. Moses demands that the Pharaoh grant your people freedom, but his heart is hard and he is unwilling to do this. When God sends ten plagues upon the Egyptians, Pharaoh finally gives in and you and the rest of the Israelites take whatever you can hold and head for the shores of the Sea of Reeds. You camp out on the shores until you hear the deafening sound of Egyptian horses and chariots in the distance, rapidly approaching. Your bloodpressure rises with fear. What now? Surely we will die at the hands of the Egyptians. Suddenly, you're not sure what has come over you, but you take a leap of faith and step into the waters of the Sea of Reeds. First your feet, then your shins, and your knees and then your waist. Before you know it, you have water up to your shoulders, chin and eventually your lips. What now? The Egyptians are coming and we are trapped. Surely I have faith that God will save us. And, just as the water is about to cover your head, you experience a miracle from God. Moses lifts his staff heavenward and a forceful wind splits the sea and a dry path forms for you and your fellow Israelites to walk upon. Together, you all walk to your freedom and as you arrive

at the opposite shore, and as the waters close once again, you raise your voices in a song of gratitude and joy to God for saving you.

Our Sages often attribute one of the most wondrous miracles of our history to the courage and faith of Nachshon ben Aminadav (Nachson the son of Aminadav), the head of the Tribe of Judah. As the Egyptians were closing in on the Israelites by the shores of the sea, Nachshon risked it all, keeping faith that God had their backs and stepped into the waters. And, it is believed that Nachshon's faith brought about this incredible miracle. Our tradition teaches that God parted the waters of the sea for Nachshon, who had dared to take the first step into the waters, and who was convinced that if he reached out to God, God would reach out to him.

As we prepare to read from parashat Beshallach, the awe-inspiring account of the Israelite exodus though the parted waters of the Sea of Reeds, I am reminded of the lesson that we should all emulate Nachshon and take the first step in situations where it might be easier to sit back and wait on the sidelines. Yes, it can be frightening and overwhelming to take that first step, but the end result is so incredibly fulfilling when we make the effort. Today, we remember Nachshon as a symbol of courage and strength, a reminder to do what is right, even if it can be difficult. From Nachshon, we can learn that no matter how trying the obstacles we face may be, we can overcome them with faith and courage. Sometimes, it just takes that first step to create positive change.

As we journey through our lives, should we ever find ourselves on our own personal shores of the sea, may we be endowed with courage and faith to take that first step, and may we be so deserving to merit the blessings of God in all that we do.



Tu B'Shevat—The Seven Species. During Tu B'Shevat, we really appreciate the goodness of the fruits that God bestows upon us. Let's consider the seven species of Israel and their benefits. Their first fruits were the only acceptable offerings in the Temple. Remember to check with your doctor before embarking on life changes.

Wheat—Wheat considerably lowers the hazards of heart disease, owing to its comparatively low-fat content. It may also regulate blood glucose levels in diabetics (check with your doctor). Wheat provides an immense energy source.

Barley—a high source of fiber, barley can help in weight loss, improved digestion and is a great source of vitamins and minerals. A FDA study evidenced that barley reduces cholesterol and risk of coronary disease.

Grapes—this delicious fruit possesses a diuretic quality and at the same time, helps to retain hydration. They are very nutritive replete with vitamins A, B, and C. Grapes help with indigestion, fatigue, kidney disorders, macular degeneration, and prevention of cataracts.

Figs—they are very rich in minerals, especially potassium, iron, and calcium strengthening bones. Figs may inhibit the absorption of dietary cholesterol, decreasing the total levels of cholesterol. They may also help prevent certain types of cancers, treatment of indigestion, and diabetes. Fig leaves can be used as a tea to treat symptoms of coughs, bronchitis, and asthma.

Pomegranates—Pomegranate seed oil may cause cancer cells to self-destruct. The juice of the fruit is said to be toxic to most breast cancer cells with no effect on the good cells. Pomegranate juice has also been proven to decrease heart disease by decreasing bad (LDH) cholesterol. It may "stall" Alzheimer's disease, protect the memory, help with Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, and block arthritis. Some studies show that pomegranate juice improves blood flow and keeps the arteries from becoming stiff and thick. It may also slow the growth of plaque in the arteries—but may interfere with blood pressure and cholesterol medicines.

Olives—health benefits including their ability to protect against heart diseases, prevent bone loss, prevent various cancers, reduce inflammation, arthritis and improve digestion. They may help to soothe allergic reactions, improve blood circulation, boost cognitive function, defend against infections, and lower the blood pressure.

Dates—the fruit from the palm tree may help in intestinal disorders, heart problems, anemia, sexual dysfunctions, diarrhea, abdominal cancer, and other conditions. They are rich in vitamins, minerals and fiber, said to strengthen bones, and reduce seasonal allergic reactions.


