

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FROM OUR RABBI

In today's society, we often think about that rejection or failure is that which holds us back from success. It's almost like that one person or organization telling us "no" is the end all. However that is the farthest from the truth. For:

> Rejection-God's Protection. Rejection-God's Redirection.

We often believe that rejection equates to failure, however if we were really able to focus our thoughts in the manner of those sayings above, then rejection is not necessarily a negative outcome, rather it is an additional opportunity given to us by God for success. In actuality, it is the refocusing and retraining of our minds in order to see the positive in life when things look dark that allows us to both to live in that light while at the same time allowing God's light to shine upon us.

This redirection also allows us to redirect our efforts into seeing that destiny is our own hands. While I don't speak Yiddish, I do know that there is a Yiddish proverb called "B'shert" (Destiny). It is often used to explain that it was one's "destiny" for something to happen. While this is a nice thought, is it really true? Is our destiny in the hands of the universe or in our own?

The answer to this question guides our thinking and how we grasp ourselves on the pathway of life. Are we in control of our cars/destiny or just a passenger within them? Judaism teaches us that man has free will, and we can find this simply put in the words of Maimonides who once said, "Could there then occur something in the world other than that willed by its Maker?" And from under his own question: Fire burns because God wills it to burn. Water flows because God wills it to flow. So, too, human beings have free will because God wills us to have free will. There is no contradiction." (Mishneh Torah, Laws of Teshuvah, 5: 4) In other words, man does have free will!

If this is the case, then how do we direct our free will towards the destiny that we would like? President Harry Truman taught us when speaking about leadership that "Actions are the seeds of fate. Deeds grow into destiny." Simply put, it is our own actions that sow the paths in our lives as well as our reputations. Thus it is up to all of us who wish to control our futures, not to let others tell us "we can't" or "that we are destined" for other things. Allowing this to happen is permitting others to live our lives for us. However as we have seen both Judaism and modern day leadership principles negate this sort of abdication.

As we face the paths of life, let us remember that we are the ones who plant and tend the seeds and pathways of our future. God told Adam to "tend" and "till" the land (Genesis 2:15) and if the first human being was told this, then who are we to allow others to "tend" and "till" our lands and destinies for us. Let us grasp onto the future with the anticipation of defining our own destiny and entrance into the Land of Israel.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Dr. Nancy Faigin, the Executive Board and Board of Trustees for their leadership during the past year. Your dedication to the synagogue is greatly appreciated. May God bless you with all that you have blessed us with and more.

Through the bitter and sweet life cycle events we have shared, it has been my endeavor to be there, by your side, helping you navigate the waters ahead, regardless of whether they were smooth or turbulent.

Leading Tot Shabbat each month for our littlest friends has been such a special experience. We sang songs and prayers together, danced and celebrated the special time each week that is Shabbat. We lit candles, learned Kiddush and HaMotzi, and played with old and new friends.

As the Education Director at CAS, it has been my greatest objective to create a joyful, nurturing, and warm Jewish learning environment for our youth. I have built a top-notch Jewish curriculum for our pre-k though 12th grades, working with our incredible faculty of skilled teachers to create outside-the-box learning experiences. Students have come to us each Sunday with excitement and enthusiasm and left us carrying with them special Jewish memories that will last them a lifetime and guide them as they travel on their Jewish journeys.

All of us are aware that change is a constant part of life. Change can be as minor as replacing a favorite pair of jeans, or as traumatic as moving to a new city. In a psychology class taken eons ago, I learned that there are major changes that will impact an individual's life. There could be a change in living status which may include addition or

deletion of a roommate, moving to a new home, moving to a new city or even a new country, change in an employment situation, which may include promotion, demotion, relocation of working environment or a change in employer. Another major change is one that impacts family structure; marriage, divorce, birth or a death. As so many others, I have been dealing with the loss of a parent. I have been successful in compartmentalizing dad's passing, but have been surprised at the amount of literature I have received from various companies offering a plethora of ways to memorialize his passing, or to provide a significant donation in his honor. Most of these mailings are legitimate, but I have to question a few of them. I do wonder, often out loud to myself, how many have responded out of guilt, remorse, or a shared senses of sentiment. We must all be careful in our responses. If you ever question a solicitation, speak with your friends, a relative or an attorney, seek the advice of others.

I have the advantage of being able to share my concerns and thoughts with my wife and with my brother. We are all aware that in time, we will resolve my father's estate and determine what to do with his house. We are able to handle most business and financial issues through the internet, over the phone and with the assistance of an attorney. The hardest though is yet to come. My father was not a hoarder, but he saved things. He had his military uniforms stored in a 'trunk' with his name and rank

printed on the top. He has clothes that he had not worn in thirty years, and of course there are still clothes in the house that my grandmother and my mother wore, both of these ladies have been gone for more than twenty years. I am not looking forward to the time I will spend in his house trying to decide what to discard and what item someone may want to have. The eventual sale of the house is a reality as none of my dad's children want to own the house. It is a reality that some vacation time will be spent in the preparation of that sale, a period of time that is inevitable.

My brothers have often thought of me as the 'lesser' Jew, as my level of observance is not the same as theirs. But in discussion of saying Kaddish, the advantage of being in a synagogue almost daily, makes it easier for me, than it is for either of them. Saying Kaddish, and Yizkor, prayers that my father took upon himself to say for so many others, is but one way of remaining close to the man that had an extremely high set of morals and values. Saying Kaddish is just one way of keeping him an active part of my life.

And yes, life continues. I was with my family enjoying the first birthday of our grandson and having the chance to watch him as he took his first steps. My grandson carries, as part of his name, the name of my father's father, a continuation of life. So, out of some sadness, comes excitement and laughter while watching this young person begin to venture across a room, on his own. The discoveries that he will make in just one room. Imagine the discoveries that he will make in a lifetime.

I had a 7th grade teacher who exposed us to the saying "learn something new every day of your life". I have had that opportunity in many ways. I suggest that you too, follow that axiom. Join some of the members of CAS at a minyon and have the opportunity to learn something new.


