FROM OUR RABBI



The more I learn about the brains of technology instead of concentrating on how to use a certain Microsoft Program or download a new file; I am more convinced that technology is the bridge towards a more global community. I am not speaking in terms of

interconnectivity, rather in terms of global partnership between countries, this even being true within the Middle East.

I have often spoken from the Bimah on military, economic and political developments with Israel and its neighbors. As we start the secular New Year, I would like to point out a new technology that Daniel has been telling me about, Blockchain technology. From what he has been describing, I am beginning to think that this technology will change the Middle East in the years to come.

As a person who observes the Middle East and closely follows Israel as the "Start Up Nation", I would like to add one more major possibility to the business and governmental world - the fostering of peace in the Middle East. The use of Blockchain technology has become a hot topic as of late. A Blockchain for Peace Hackathon currently took place hosted by Peace Accelerators, Stanford's Peace Innovation Lab and Bushwick Blockchain Alliance. Blockchain for Peace's Law & Governance Hackathon is aimed to "bring top Peace advocates, creative technologists and Blockchain experts into a room to devote their weekend to making the world a better place for everyone." Sounds like a great project as our "Prayer for Peace" cannot do the job without human participation.

While this is a great goal, the question remains-how can open ledger technology (i.e. Blockchain Technology) be used as a vehicle towards peace? I am convinced that one area whereby Blockchain technology can facilitate cooperation in the Middle East is in the field of agriculture. The common denominator in the region, as we saw on our recent Israel trip, is its desert landform and the difficulty of agriculture maximization and utilization of produce grown. Countries such as Israel, as we saw, have utilized innovative technologies such as advanced drip irrigation (I know Stephanie Zavala is smiling at this point) to solve this problem.

In 1965, Kibbutz Hatzerim built a whole new industry, Netafim. This industry, which is translated as "drops", is not really drops but "drips", better known as drip irrigation. The newest models are self-cleaning and maintain undeviating flow rate irrespective of water quality and pressure. Presently, new drip irrigation technology called "Tipa" uses gravity when there is no water supply or water pressure coming to rural areas. It is currently being utilized in the deserts of Senegal for crop growth. Such a system should serve as a model for the entirety of the region.

Blockchain technology itself improves efficiency of field operations by connecting sensors and sensor data and analyzing it in real time via Artificial Intelligence. Distributing this information onto the blockchain whereby it can be verified and shared in either a controlled or an open format could serve as a step-in peaceful technology partnership. In this instance, Middle Eastern Countries would be able to use this data to replicate the process, whereby water would not be needed to irrigate the desert. Real time results and information based upon climate information would also allow the regions countries to adapt and inscribe real-time information that they are using in furthering their produce growth.

If water was to disappear as an issue in the Middle East, I believe that a large part of the conflict in the region would dissipate. Why? Due to the fact, that each country would be able to feed their own population without having to buy or conquer other countries resources, as Syria has tried to do in the past with the Kinneret. There is no doubt that this would serve as a first step in the utilization of Blockchain technology for peaceful purposes in the fields of water and agriculture in the Middle East.

As we can see from this one example, technology holds within itself the possibility of furthering cooperation and peaceful relations around the world. This is especially true in the Middle East, where much of this cutting-edge technology is being developed. There is no doubt in my mind that technology transcends borders and that Blockchain technology will be leading this path forward.

I hope that we can now look at the Middle East with a different dimension, in hopes of understanding 21st century trends towards peace.

GENERAL INFORMATION

IRS Required Minimum Distributions

The IRS mandates that you begin taking money out of your IRA at age 70 1/2 which increases your taxable income and may even push you into a higher tax bracket.

Opportunity to Reduce Taxable Income

Consider directing your mandated distribution from your IRA to support Congregation Ahavath Sholom. Your gift will not be counted as income. The IRS will consider your required minimum distribution fulfilled and you may save thousands in higher taxes.

Requirements

- You must be of 70 1/2 years old.
- The transfer must be paid directly from your IRA to Congregation Ahavath Sholom.
- The gift cannot exceed \$100,000 in 2018. Married spouses can combine their gifts and can contribute \$200,000.
- The gift must be outright, but it can be used to satisfy existing pledges.


FORT WORTH AND TARRANT COUNTY JEWISH FAMILY SERVICES
