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FROM OUR RABBI



On the front cover of the Bulletin, you can see a picture of Rabbi Zimelman and me checking the Kashrut of one of our Sefer Torahs. This is of vital importance, for as you will see below, even one mistake would render the Torah Pasul (Impure) and we would not be able to read from it. Periodically,

each Torah must be checked in order to gauge its ability to be read from. Thank God, the two we have checked so far, are in good condition.

As a reminder, the Torah itself, contains the Five Books of Moses (Bereshit, Shemot, Vayikra, Bamidbar and Devarim), consists of the traditions, laws and customs that stand at the center of Judaism. They record God's creation of the world, the selection and growth of Patriarchs, Matriarchs, their offspring and descendants in relationship to God and the land of Canaan, the exile to Egypt and the Exodus from Egypt. They furthermore trace the 12 Tribes of Judah transforming into the People of Israel, the receiving of the Decalogue, the Israelites entrance into a covenantal relationship with God, their wandering in the desert and eventual arrival at the borders of Eretz Yisrael.

According to the Kitzur Schulchan Aruch, 28: 3 "A person is obligated to treat a Torah scroll with great respect and it is praiseworthy to appoint it a special place and to respect that place and beautify it...and one who sees someone carrying a Torah scroll must rise before it until the Torah scroll is placed in its position or until one no longer sees it." The Torah itself has been read publically since 450 BCE, which is approximately the time of Ezra.

In terms of writing a Sefer Torah, there are a number of laws and customs that must be followed.

- The Torah Scroll must be written by a specially trained pious scribe called a sofer.
- A sofer must know more than 4,000 Judaic laws before he begins writing a Torah Scroll.
- The entire Torah is written by hand. Each letter is inscribed and individually formed with a quill and specially prepared ink.
- The Torah is made of many sheets of parchment that are sewn together to make one very long scroll.
- Each page has 42 lines.

- There are 304.805 letters in a Torah Scroll.
- It takes about a year to write an entire Torah Scroll.
- The Torah we use today in our synagogue is written exactly the same way the Torah has been for over 3000 years.

According to the Rambam (Maimonides) there are 20 reasons a Torah becomes Pasul;

- 1. It was written on the hide of a non-kosher species of animal
- 2. It was written on the unprocessed hide of a kosher species of animal.
- 3. The hide was not processed with the intent of being used for a Sefer Torah.
- 4. It was written on the wrong side of the parchment.
- 5. It was written not completely on the Klaf (Parchment).
- 6. It was not written on a kosher parchment.
- 7. It was not scribed.
- 8. It was written with a non-durable black ink.
- 9. It was written in a language other than Hebrew.
- 10. An apostate, heretic or similar wrote it.
- 11. The names of God were not written with the proper intentions.
- 12. A letter is missing.
- 13. A letter is added.
- 14. Two letters touch.
- 15. The form of a letter is spoiled because it is punctured or the like.
- 16. Letters are so far apart that one word appears as two or the letters are so close together that two words appear as one
- 17. The breaks between Parshiyot have been altered.
- 18. The forms for the two Songs have been altered
- 19. Other sections of the Torah have been written in the form of these two Songs.
- 20. The Yiriot have been sewn together using non-kosher sinew.

As you can see, the laws and customs that go into writing the most holy object in our sanctuary are many and extremely detailed. This being due to the fact, that they are the word of God and just as he is holy, so too are his words.

I hope this small explanation, will allow us all to better understand the makeup both physically and spiritually of our sacred scrolls and add even more holiness to the Torah Service.

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Most of us have been presented with numerous challenges throughout our lifetime. Some we may consider minor while others are major life events. We often challenge ourselves to follow a diet, a physical improvement routine or to get from point A to point B using a different route. With children, the challenges can leave indelible marks. How do

we parent? Do we do what our parents did to us, or do we attempt to do the opposite of our parents? Do we at times actually find ourselves doing something that we had told ourselves, "I won't do that with my child"?

What do we do when told by a physician that we or a loved one has a disease? Not necessarily a terminal one, but one that will require long term treatment. Do we give up or do we fight? Do we make a concerted effort to beat the illness and to convince our loved one to fight on? Most of us would take that course of action, keeping in the back of our mind, the concept of dignity and quality of life.

With children of special needs, parents, educators and the child are challenged every day. Often we take for granted the simple act of putting on a coat. I know of at least two different ways of teaching that task. We can break the task into smaller steps, moving a hand into a sleeve, moving the arm through the sleeve and rewarding these small steps until the goal of putting on the coat independently is achieved. We do the same when teaching children to swim, to cross the street safely or to maintain safe distances from those they do not know.

Do we challenge ourselves to be better individuals or do we only accept the status quo? Can we do something better for another, for a family member, for our community or for ourselves? Hopefully we are not that self-centered that we do not visualize a means of self-improvement and positively impact those around us.

I am offering you a slightly different challenge. An opportunity to do something for another. Pick at least one day a week or one day a month and join members of Congregation Ahavath Sholom at minyan. Our morning service is at 6:55am, Monday through Friday and 9:00am on Sunday and legal holidays. Our evening services are held at 6:00pm. We need at least 10 Jewish adults in order for someone to say Kaddish for a loved one and it is just another way to spend time with your extended family.

Scavenger Hunt Turns Up Clues to CAS History

What better way to learn local Jewish history than to discover for whom the Zale Auditorium was named, which family the Brachman Parlor honors, and why the computer lab has the name Sankary above the door.

Dafna Ninio's Sunday school class found out who's who by going on a Memory Scavenger Hunt designed by their teacher, with help from the Fort Worth Jewish Archives. Working in teams, the 5th and 6th graders roamed the hallways, looking for clues about people who invested time and money in our synagogue and left a Jewish legacy.

On a wall outside the library, the students studied photos of the shul's past presidents, dating back to 1892. Among the framed pictures were Al Sankary, Leon Brachman, and his uncle, Rabbi A.J. Brachman.

They learned that the Zale family's grandfather was a poor immigrant who painted the congregation's original shul. His name was Sam Zalefsky. His grandsons, M.B. and William, shortened the family name to Zale and made it big in the jewelry business. The Zale Foundation, aware that Ahavath Sholom was their family's first house of worship in America, was generous when our building was under construction and donated a substantial sum. By the way, the head of the building committee was Al Sankary.

As for the Brachman Parlor, several Brachman-family ancestors were among Ahavath Sholom's charter members. Leon Brachman chaired dozens of committees. His wife, Fay Brachman, was Ladies Auxiliary president in 1948 when the gift shop got its start. She also started the Fort Worth Jewish Archives.

The Sankary name is inscribed on the marble World War One honor roll at the outside entrance to the building. Another Sankary served in WWII. His name is on the framed calligraphic scroll in the corridor that lists all the local Jewish GIs of the era. On that scroll are several Brachman boys.

"This sheds light on families active in the life of the synagogue, people who invested time and money to benefit fellow congregants and future generations," said Dafna.

The inspiration for the scavenger hunt is in the Religious School curriculum. It includes a unit called Zikaron – Hebrew for remembrance. The Religious School's core curriculum was designed by the Institute for Southern Jewish Life. Dafna put a local stamp on it.

A festive reception was held to celebrate "Gone 2 Texas," the archival exhibit that focuses on Russian and South African immigrants who settled in Fort Worth during the 1970s, '80s, and '90s. The party was to thank everyone who contributed to the exhibit, including the board of the Jewish Federation of Fort Worth & Tarrant County. The Federation has supported the Fort Worth Jewish Archives since its creation in 1994.

Although the party was at Beth-El, a major portion of the exhibit is at Ahavath Sholom in the corridor outside the library. It features art and artifacts – such as copper pots, samovars, Russian nesting dolls, and African sculptures – brought to Texas by congregants Anita Davidson, Bernard Zilberg, Claudia Boksiner, and Alex and Sophia Nason.



GENERAL INFORMATION

IRS Required Minimum Distributions

The IRS mandates that you begin taking money out of your IRA at age 70 1/2 which increases your taxable income and may even push you into a higher tax bracket.

Opportunity to Reduce Taxable Income

Consider directing your mandated distribution from your IRA to support Congregation Ahavath Sholom. Your gift will not be counted as income. The IRS will consider your required minimum distribution fulfilled and you may save thousands in higher taxes.

Requirements

- You must be of 70 1/2 years old.
- The transfer must be paid directly from your IRA to Congregation Ahavath Sholom.
- The gift cannot exceed \$100,000 in 2019. Married spouses can combine their gifts and can contribute \$200,000.
- The gift must be outright, but it can be used to satisfy existing pledges.


FORT WORTH AND TARRANT COUNTY JEWISH FAMILY SERVICES
