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

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FROM OUR RABBI



Charles was a very wealthy man. He had spent many years brokering huge mergers between multinational corporations, and his stock had skyrocketed. At the age of thirty, he was already worth 600 million dollars. For his 35th birthday, he bought himself a hundred acre ranch in Utah. Soon he had made it onto the list of Forbes richest 100.

The problem with Charles was that he never gave charity his entire life. Every day poor people and organizations would come to his office making their plea, but to no avail. Charles was a miserly scrooge and didn't want to part with any of his money - not even a penny of it.

Just after his 40th birthday, Charles tragically died in a bizarre boating accident while vacationing on his yacht. As he went up to the gates of heaven, Charles noticed a long line of people twisting around several clouds waiting to get in. As each person passed through the gate, an angel would ask, "How much charity did you give during your lifetime?" The person would respond with a dollar amount and would be allowed to pass through. As the line moved along Charles got a bit worried as he knew that his charitable contributions didn't amount to much. Finally, it was his turn.

"How much charity did you give during your lifetime?" the angel asked Charles.

"To be honest with you, I really didn't give much money to the poor." As he said this, Charles reached into his back pocket and pulled out his checkbook. "But, I'd be more than happy to rectify the situation." He opened up his checkbook. "Just tell me who to make the check out to."

A bit startled, the angel looked at Charles and said, "Sorry, but we don't take checks here. We only accept receipts." (Torah from Dixie by Benyamin Cohen)

This story answers our questions from above and teaches us that it is the receipt of our giving instead of the future promise to give that makes all the difference in the world. It is in this light that I would like to highlight two Tzedakah projects that our congregation is in the midst of. One we have already started and the launch of the second one will commence with the publication of this article.

The first Tzedakah project came from a very generous anonymous donation that was to be used for a Tikkun Olam project. With this donation we came up with a Tikkun Olam project for the Learning and Engagement Center. The project is in partnership with DRC-Solutions. The DRC's mission is to support and be a leader in Permanent Supportive Housing. Within this mission they help house, mentor and support families transitioning from homelessness to a home. A part of this support is finding partnerships with individuals or institutions that can help turn these new houses (apartments) into homes.

It is with this in mind that our LE&C is partnering up with a family (single mother and 7 children) and helping turn her apartment into a home. They are accomplishing this by using the donation to purchase what is needed for this family. In order to make it even more personal, each class has received a list of a child or room that they are responsible for buying what is needed. They will do this in conjunction with the entirety of the class going together and the purchases being paid for through the donation that we have received. Furthermore, we will then continue our connection with the family so that they are supported and become one with the wider community. We will be delivering our donations the Sunday after Purim in light of the mitzvah "Matanot L'Evvonim" (donations to those in need). Not only will our students be performing the mitzvah of tikkun olam, but they will also be learning Torah at the same time. My sincerest thanks to our donor for his support and vision for our Learning and Engagement Center.

The second Tikkun Olam project that we will be taking on as a synagogue is also in the realm of helping those who have transitioned from homelessness to Permanent Supportive Housing. When someone enters a new apartment they do so with nothing. The apartment is there, but living within it and being able to function is a whole different layer. Thus, after having met with the city we are going to take on the mitzvah of collecting, organizing and delivering these "welcome baskets" as they are called to those who are moving into their new apartments. All of us have been blessed and it is now our turn to help pass on those blessings to others as well. There is nothing more gratifying then being able to "save a life" (Babylonian Talmud) and we can do this by saving someone from the worry of how to live in a home with dignity and the essentials needed to flourish. The list of what is needed is below and you can bring them to the office and we will coordinate their storage until we as a synagogue put everything together.

Now, imagine the same push towards religion; the attendance at services, the actual participation during the service, or even the attendance at lunch. PRESIDENT'S DESK

Shalom. The daffodils planted by the CAS Learning and Engagement Center have begun to pop-up outside the school entrance. Winter is halfway done and Spring is almost here.

Many congregants have asked about our plans for a new building or renovations to the current building. What's happening with this important activity? Let me briefly describe the history of the project, what we have completed and our plans.

First, a brief history. After years of informal discussions, the project formally began in 2015 with a meeting amongst community leaders to discuss the need for the project, our collective vision for the future, the resources available and the leadership team. Shortly after, the Congregation formally decided that it was appropriate to sell excess CAS land to help fund construction. The Focus on the Future Committee was formed to lead the land sale initiative. This culminated in a sale to the Fort Worth ISD under very favorable terms. The sales agreement with the school district was signed in July 2018 and the money immediately transferred to our treasury.

Since reaching this important milestone, we developed a "Board-Dedicated Fund Agreement" which ensures that all land sale proceeds (\$6.8 million) will be dedicated to the next step in the congregation's building project and any remainder reserved for future building maintenance. The principle will not be used to pay off debt or used for day-to-day operating funds. The Agreement sets up a barrier that prevents us from using these funds for any other purpose without a thorough review process and the overt approval of the Congregation. I want to thank Dan Karpman for his persistence and recognize the valuable input received from many congregants and our outside attorney. The Agreement was signed in February 2019.

Our next step is to carefully define a path forward and put together the team that will get us there. We are in the process of forming a small, efficient leadership team and defining the structure and membership for the many committees required to ensure that the needs of our congregants are met. Many individuals have offered to help and I expect to provide further details in the next few weeks.

As always, your ideas and questions are welcome. Let me hear from you.

Dear Kids, Parents, and Congregants,

It's been a long time and we've been wanting to write you. Between our "real" jobs and running the Learning Center, seconds are precious. We've taken a few deep

breaths and found some time to sit down and write to you about the CAS Learning & Engagement Center.

As you might have heard, CAS has partnered with the Institute for Southern Jewish Life's (ISJL's) education department to bring our students and teachers a rich learning curriculum along with outstanding teacher training.

We don't want our students to be bored, learning the *same things*, the *same ways*. Our spiraling curriculum revisits key content in new and increasingly sophisticated ways. Maybe you've seen the kids singing HaTikvah at the flag poles, dancing out front, or crafting edible Torahs. Perhaps you've observed the kids on a historical scavenger hunt for information on our Shul elders, or on the "Drum Line" singing, drumming, and chiming *Etz Chaim* or *O'seh Shalom*. Come join us for our musicals at 12:15 pm on Sundays and have some fun!

Teachers appreciate that each lesson plan begins with the "Big Idea" then moves on to detailed break-downs of topics and activities marked by learning styles (visual, auditory, movement.) Best of all teachers get lesson-specific lists of source texts, art supplies, internet links, film, music, and visuals. What an amazing job they're doing!

Our assigned ISJL Fellow, Hannah, supports us "on demand" whenever we have questions. Twice this year she spent 3-day weekends with us (and joins us again March 1, 2, and 3) to observe our operations and engage our teachers, and join our Shabbat celebrations. She's really helped us with adopting and using the full range of learning materials.

It's getting late, but here are some closing thoughts. Attendance at 90% or more each week indicates how much the kids like the program. You might be surprised to learn that even the sleepy high schoolers make it each Sunday, alternating between a Sunday of Confirmation Class study and a Sunday of their beloved Madrichim (Guides) program. First period is child development and leadership, and second period they go into the classrooms to work with the teachers and the kids.

Oh, and our website, though still under construction, showcases pictures and other information you can enjoy now.

To see the smiles of the kids and the joy of the teachers each Sunday makes this the best volunteer job we've ever had! We don't know when we'll be able to write you again, but it won't be long.








Dr. Julian Haber will soon begin work on Volume 3 of *They Were Soldiers in Peace and War*. These are his areas of focus:



Doris Levy's 1936 Scrapbook Finally has a Virtual Home

died May 24, 1936, without ever seeing the Lone Star flag she won in the Texas Centennial Scrapbook Contest. Now the little girl's colorful flag and her prize-winning album are online for posterity to see.

Thanks to a Rescuing Texas History grant awarded to the Fort Worth Jewish Archives,

you can flip through Doris's amazing scrapbook at the Portal to Texas History website, texashistory.unt.edu/explore/ partners/FWJA/. The album is filled with hundreds of newspaper and magazine articles that the fourth-grade girl painstakingly cut out and pasted onto each page. Also, inside the fragile album are rare picture postcards and snapshots of sites around Fort Worth—such as the Van Zandt Cottage on Crestline Rd. which today has a historic marker.

Doris's father, E.A. "Al" Levy, was among the founding families at Ahavath Sholom. Doris lived with her parents at 1929 Dartmoor Court and went to school at Lily B. Clayton Elementary where there was great excitement about the Texas Centennial celebrations.

Tragically, the day the judges announced that Doris Levy's album won a statewide honorable mention, she was in a coma, battling pneumonia, strep throat, and peritonitis following an appendectomy. She was buried near the entrance gates

at Emanuel Hebrew Rest, the pioneer Jewish cemetery at 1414 South Main Street.

Although Doris's prize, a small Lone Star flag rimmed in gold fringe, is wrinkled and stained, its colors remain bright.



The Fort Worth Jewish Ar-

chives received the flag and the scrapbook in 2014 from two Levy family descendants—Shmuel Gomes and his mother, Kiely Gomes, who live in California. For decades, the family had wanted to place the delicate album in a good home.



Spotlight on Cowtown Cowgirl, Frances Rosenthal Kallison Article by Hollace Weiner

A new anthology, Texas Women and Ranching, includes a chapter about a Jewish cowgirl born in Fort Worth. She was Frances Elaine Rosenthal Kalli-

son (1908-2004), a horsewoman and a historian whose father and uncles were among the founding members of Beth-El Congregation.




Kallison grew up riding the draft horses that pulled her father's furniture wagons in downtown Fort Worth. She married into a San Antonio ranching family, invited busloads of GIs to barbeques at the ranch, and co-founded a ladies' precision riding team that raised money for children's health care.

She wrote articles about and palominos and a probing essays analyzing Jewish acculturation in frontier Texas. As regional president of the National Council of

Jewish Women, she lobbied to end the state poll tax. She is the only Jewish woman in the National Cowgirl Museum and Hall of Fame.

IRS Required Minimum Distributions

The IRS mandates that you begin taking money out of your IRA at age 70 1/2 which increases your taxable income and may even push you into a higher tax bracket.

Opportunity to Reduce Taxable Income

Consider directing your mandated distribution from your IRA to support Congregation Ahavath Sholom. Your gift will not be counted as income. The IRS will consider your required minimum distribution fulfilled and you may save thousands in higher taxes.

Requirements

- You must be of 70 1/2 years old.
- The transfer must be paid directly from your IRA to Congregation Ahavath Sholom.
- The gift cannot exceed \$100,000 in 2019. Married spouses can combine their gifts and can contribute \$200,000.
- The gift must be outright, but it can be used to satisfy existing pledges.


