The question of an individual's Jewish identity, and the importance of guarding our identity is essential to

the Jewish People's future. A Midrash from Genesis Rabbah, on this very subject asks the question of why is Abraham called a "Hebrew" (Genesis 14:13).

The Midrash notes, that the root of ivri, the word for Hebrew, can mean either Hebrew, or side, as in the side of a river (Genesis Rabbah 42:8). Based on that interpretation, the Midrash states, "Abraham was on one side of the river, and the rest of the world was on the other."

Being on one side of the river, when the rest of our society is on the other (without actually cutting ourselves off from the other side) can actually be the very essence of Jewish survival. After more than a century of fighting our way, into the center of society, the next big question that looms ahead for American Jews is whether we will have the courage at times to proudly stand up for our own identity, no matter what side of the river this might place us on.

I believe that the path we should follow is one where we celebrate who we are, and not shy away from proudly identifying ourselves with the Jewish community. The Torah teaches us to be, "a light among the nations" (Isaiah 49:6). To accomplish this we need to be proud of our religion, our history, our heritage, our beliefs and our individuality. One of the things that truly is a foundational piece of our identity is prayer in general and the Shema more specifically. The Shema, which we pray both in the morning and the evening, is one of the most well-known religious and liturgical prayers in Judaism. The Shema was recited publicly after the Decalogue in the Temple service, and by the first century C.E. the three paragraphs (Deut. 6: 4-9, Deut. 11: 13-21, Num. 15:39) that formulate the I itself became the centerpiece of Jewish prayer alongside of the Amidah.

The very first paragraph of the Shema alone can be interpreted on four different levels.

1. "...The Lord is One"- speaks about the unity of God and Judaism's belief in monotheism.

2. "And you shall love..."- speaks to us on an emotional (love) level.

3. "And you shall teach them..."- speaks to ones intellect.

4. "And you shall bind them..."- speaks to the ritual side of Judaism.

As we can see the Shema speaks to our emotions and intellect, while at the same time being both covenantal and cultural within the lives of the Jewish people. This prayer is truly a multi-faceted and deeply rich prayer, and one of the paths through which Jews throughout the ages have always connected to Adonai.

Rabbi Max Arzt Z"L, former Vice Chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary, once wrote, that "only when all four of these aspects come together in one's life can he/she truly embrace Judaism in general and God in specific" (Max Arzt, Justice and Mercy, New York: The Burning Bush Press, 1963. pg.69-70).

In this light we can understand that learning to pray takes many different forms and needs to be addressed on many different levels. However, the main component of spiritual growth is in fact, the opportunity to discover multiple paths towards finding meaning in our daily prayer lives.

I hope that this realization, and the knowledge of the different levels of meaning within the Shema, will help us all deepen our identity so that we will survive and thrive as individuals and as a community both in the present and into the future.

This season is a time of change and renewal for both Congregation Ahavath Sholom and my own family. As the new school year begins and the High Holidays approach, we evaluate the past and look forward to the opportunities a new year brings with it. My wife, Andrea, and our sons, Sam and Ben, are overjoyed to be joining this historic congregation and

welcoming community. Negotiating new situations can be both challenging and exciting. From my first days as a student at the Jewish Theological Seminary, I have felt strongly about the motto, "Tradition and Change". It is possible to keep what has been and even revitalize it, while making additions and changes as the needs of a community need to be continually met. If you haven't yet had the opportunity to join us on a Friday night for a service, one of the new things you will notice for some parts of the service is the use of a twelvestring guitar and some contemporary tunes. For some reason, as the High Holy Days approach, I find myself becoming nostalgic. Having moved a number of times, I am acutely aware of the changes in synagogue life, the variations of the service and the changes in synagogue culture. In some cases, the names of the players may change, but the actions and the roles that some play, remain the same. I have also found myself

thinking of more youthful times, the carefree days and family visits when I was in High School, and the social interaction of my peers occurring during the services and what we considered the Yizkor break. Some of those memories are quite vivid, while others are really murky, and some, I would love to forget all together; the foibles of youth. Of course, the friendships that were made then, were friendships that were cast in stone. Too many of my friends have passed on. Yet, surprisingly, there are three that I am still in touch with, and we do actually speak to each other. Yes, there are the Facebook friends and the few that pop up every so often on classmates.com. To remain in touch with college friends and those friends made over the years, help keep things in life rooted. Judaism has strong roots; many are passed down from generation to generation, others are the traditions and customs that we have elected to follow. I am extremely aware that my brothers have chosen to be more rooted than I in our customs, traditions and in levels of observance. How interesting, three boys from the same home, with different levels of observance. Our parents, and grandparents all seemed to vary in interpretation of observance, yet we all considered ourselves as Jews.

There was a period of time when we were told not to make waves, not to draw attention to ourselves and our heritage. It was ok when we were not permitted into a specific country club, we would form our own. The same for college fraternities. In the recent past, many of those fraternities that excluded us, now want us as members. Today however, we cannot be silent. There are too many instances of Anti-Semitism occurring. I am now receiving daily notices of multiple occurrences when just a few months ago, these notifications were infrequent. We seem to be one group that is easy to attack. That and for other concerns, we are much more aware of security. We lock our doors, monitor some visitors and have armed officers when we have services. Our congregation is not alone, security of members has become a priority in many synagogues across the country as a result of specific incidents and to be proactive. It is important that we welcome our guests, but with some caution.

As we enter this time of year, Pat and I wish you a sweet and healthy year, Shannah Tovah. And if there was something I said, or did, or did not do, I humbly ask for your forgiveness.

SECURITY ANNOUNCEMENT

If you have ever flown on a plane, you are aware and accustomed to the announcement on how to use a seat belt, the emergency oxygen and the location of all the exits.

Safety and security within CAS are everyone's responsibility. Should there be a need to evacuate the building, please immediately follow the direction of Police, Rabbi, Executive Director or Board President.

If these individuals direct you to evacuate the building, please immediately follow the directions. Offer to assist others, but if they are not leaving, do not hesitate to exit yourself and do not worry about personal items.

We have established a **Rally Point**, the parking lot of the library if you can do so safely. If not, head south to the First Command building. First responders will verify who is at the Rally Point and if you are not there, it will be assumed that you are still in the building.

Take a moment and visualize the **exits**: There is an emergency exit in the glass wall of the chapel; there are exits near the sanctuary, and the school, and there is an exit at the south end of the building within the school wing. In addition, there are two exits (east and west) near the kitchen, and an exit from the Zale that leads to the area close to the flag pole.

FIRE: If there is a fire, the alarm will sound and signal lights will flash. There is a fire alarm pull station at the exit doors, and fire extinguishers located throughout the building. There are staff and members that are aware of the various emergency buttons.

Medical: There is an oxygen tank in the foyer, next to the entrance to the hall leading to the bimah. An AED is located opposite the synagogue office and a first aid kit is located in the area of the copy machine. Wheelchairs are located next to the kitchen in the Northeast part of the building.

POWER FAILURE: There is emergency lighting throughout the building that will turn on when there is a power failure.

OTHER EMERGENCY: Staff and some members are aware of the location of various emergency buttons through out the building. Should there be a need to utilize this system, or to protect from severe weather, you will be given specific directions to either shelter in place (Run-Hide-Fight) or to evacuate the building. Should evacuation be necessary, remember the Rally Point.



HIGH HOLY DAY PARKING INFORMATION

As a result of the school construction, parking in the CAS parking lot will be limited. We have increased the number of 'handicapped' parking spaces, however, if you are not here early, there is a probability that you will not find a place to park. To alleviate that situation, we will have shuttle service available. Overflow parking will be permitted in the west section of the Doxology Bible Church parking lot (see map). The shuttle service will run almost continuously and provide service to and from the parking lot and CAS. We will be providing shuttle service the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur. Parking on the street is also permitted.

"Gone 2 Texas" Exhibit Extended thru May 2020

The eye-catching exhibit in the corridor, filled with African sculptures and Russian keepsakes, has been extended through the end of May 2020. The family of the late-Bernard Zilberg,

(shown in the picture on the right) who donated Zulu walking sticks and heirloom copper pots to the displays, has requested that his memorabilia and those of other immigrants remain on exhibit until Dr. Zilberg's unveiling in May.



Titled "Gone 2 Texas," the

exhibit intertwines the histories of Jewish migration from South Africa and the Soviet Union from the 1970s to the 1990s.



New to the exhibit is South African currency engraved with images of lions, water buffalo, and hippos. Also added is a set of vintage Russian nesting dolls that children in the Religious School may handle. In one of the locked display cases there is now a comical set of matryoshka dolls with likenesses of Bill and Hillary Clinton, Monica Lewinsky, Gennifer Flowers, and a saxophone.

The exhibit was organized by the Fort

Worth Jewish Archives. It includes African textiles, Zulu jewelry, and wood carvings on loan from Anita Davidson; also a Soviet samovar from Alex and Sophia Nason; and a Gzhel teapot from Claudia Boksiner.
