

FROM OUR RABBI



Reflections on Judaism's view regarding Civil Rights, Community Strife and Fears of Abandonment and healing in light of Atatiana Jefferson's tragic death.

"A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for a time of adversity." (Proverbs 17:17)

Early during Shabbat mornings services on October 12th, I received reports about the tragic shooting and death of Atatiana Jefferson at the hands of former FWPD Officer Aaron Dean, who in the interim has been arrested and charged with murder.

While emotions remain high, assumptions about the FWPD and city leaders are being made and blame being spreading around towards individuals and groups, I must say that we must not let the actions of a few individuals such as Aaron Dean define an entire city and community. Unfortunately, and with great sorrow, we cannot bring Ms. Jefferson back to life, but we can in her memory, help deepen the bonds between us by "loving our neighbor" instead of fraying the bonds that bind us together as creations of God.

How do we do this? We do this by seeing the image of God within each of us and acting on that image instead of denying God's image in others who may not look, think or believe like ourselves. For only when we come together, will such atrocities like the death of Atatiana Jefferson become a single aberration within the multitude of morality that our communities are built upon.

In light of this horrific death, I am reminded of the teachings of Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel. Heschel (1907-1972) was a Polish survivor of the Holocaust who was arrested by the Gestapo in October of 1938 and fled the Nazis in 1939. Upon coming to America, he became a leading religious figure and civil rights activist who marched and

partnered with Martin Luther King JR. In the fight for civil rights. In today's times of upheaval and the fracturing of communities, I believe that it is important that we remember his words.

Heschel believed that "A religious man is a person who holds God and man in one thought at one time, at all times, who suffers harm done to others, whose greatest passion is compassion, whose greatest strength is love and defiance of despair." In other words, when one person hurts, we all hurt, and when injustice occurs it is felt within all communities. Communities are hurting today!

Heschel went on to say that, "Racism [Anti-Semitism and all other prejudices with an 'ism' at the end of the word] is man's gravest threat to man - the maximum of hatred for a minimum of reason." However, this minimum of "reason," must be our "reason" to join the struggle for mutual respect among us all. For as Heschel said while standing next to MLK Jr. "God is every man's pedigree. He is either the Father of all men or of no man. The image of God is either in every man or in no man.... God's covenant is with all men, and we must never be oblivious of the equality of the divine dignity of all men."

Let us al also remember, that "In light of pain, healing eventually comes."

Who leads this healing irrespective of this pain is in our own personal or communal lives? We do! For as the Civil Rights leader Ralph Abernathy once taught, "I don't know what the future may hold, but I know who holds the future."

In other words, the future is in our hands! Thus, we must make the conscious decision to hold our futures with positivity. For we must always remember the words of the Deuteronomist, those being, "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; He will never leave you nor forsake you." (Deuteronomy 31:6) If God will never forsake us, neither should we forsake ourselves and a positive outlook towards our futures.

Let us as a synagogue and community all work together so that God's image and man's dignity grows within each of us, not only in times of trouble and travail but rather lives within us at all times.

On behalf of us all, I pray that God will bring comfort to Ms. Jefferson's family, support and love to her nephew and healing to our entire city. May the memory of Atatiana Jefferson be for a blessing now and forever more.

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



The human ear can distinguish sound between the frequencies of 20 Hertz to 20,000 Hertz. The range of human speech is between 1,000 Hertz and 5,000 Hertz. As we age, exposure to loud sounds, disco music, and the natural aging process there are some frequencies that we do not hear as well as we did in our youth. One may find that some conversations are often

lost or misinterpreted. I am certain that you have been involved with asking or being asked a question and the response had not been associated with the question. There is also the phenomenon known as selective hearing; choosing to ignore what is being said, sometimes done on purpose other times it may be a result of fright.

You have Cancer! Three hollow words spoken by a medical professional. Anything said by the physician following those words are not heard or not understood as the mind begins to wander. Of course, we can substitute numerous diagnosis or a whole host of disorders, but the reaction is the same. Why me? What did I do? How long will I live? What do I do next? How do I tell my spouse, my children, my friends?

The bible addresses Leprosy more than three dozen times. Directions are provided about removal, cleanliness and separation. Today some of the same applications require similar processes to various situations. Medical facilities specialize in treating specific conditions with positive outcomes. If there is a downside to these specialized facilities it may be that they are located miles away, in another city or even in another state.

Some individuals may elect to carry this burden silently and alone, while others may be compelled to share their story with anyone willing to listen. I cannot help but wonder what happens to the person with no family or no close friend, how do they carry that weight alone?

By our own nature, we assume everyone around us is well and in good physical health. Of course, we do know those that are not as healthy as we would hope, but we know of their illness and are ready to provide support if asked. Most of us know many of our members especially those that typically participate is one or more of our services. How often do we realize when someone did not attend, or had not attended a number of consecutive services, and if we did, what did we do about it? Did we ask someone else, or did we pick up the telephone and call? As a member of an extended family, that is what each of us should do and not assume that someone else will make that call. It is better that six people make that phone call, than none.

We really are responsible for each other, and now that a new year has begun, start with a new chapter in your book of life with positive thoughts about all those you have contact. Think of others and do for others as you would hope that they would do for you!

SECURITY ANNOUNCEMENT

If you have ever flown on a plane, you are aware and accustomed to the announcement on how to use a seat belt, the emergency oxygen and the location of all the exits

Safety and security within CAS are everyone's responsibility. Should there be a need to evacuate the building, please immediately follow the direction of Police, Rabbi, Executive Director or Board President.

If these individuals direct you to evacuate the building, please immediately follow the directions. Offer to assist others, but if they are not leaving, do not hesitate to exit yourself and do not worry about personal items.

We have established a **Rally Point**, the parking lot of the library if you can do so safely. If not, head south to the First Command building. First responders will verify who is at the Rally Point and if you are not there, it will be assumed that you are still in the building.

Take a moment and visualize the **exits**: There is an emergency exit in the glass wall of the chapel; there are exits near the sanctuary, and the school, and there is an exit at the south end of the building within the school wing. In addition, there are two exits (east and west) near the kitchen, and an exit from the Zale that leads to the area close to the flag pole.

FIRE: If there is a fire, the alarm will sound and signal lights will flash. There is a fire alarm pull station at the exit doors, and fire extinguishers located throughout the building. There are staff and members that are aware of the various emergency buttons.

Medical: There is an oxygen tank in the foyer, next to the entrance to the hall leading to the bimah. An AED is located opposite the synagogue office and a first aid kit is located in the area of the copy machine. Wheelchairs are located next to the kitchen in the Northeast part of the building.

POWER FAILURE: There is emergency lighting throughout the building that will turn on when there is a power failure.

OTHER EMERGENCY: Staff and some members are aware of the location of various emergency buttons through out the building. Should there be a need to utilize this system, or to protect from severe weather, you will be given specific directions to either shelter in place (Run-Hide-Fight) or to evacuate the building. Should evacuation be necessary, remember the Rally Point.

La S'hana Tova! Wishing each of you a Sweet, Healthy and Happy New Year!


We held another successful honey fundraising event as you wished your family and friends a sweet year. Thank you!




