FROM OUR RABBI



How do we protect ourselves from the scary times that we live in? This question seems even more relevant with the spreading of the Coronavirus.

Undoubtedly,

we must take health and physical precautions into consideration, especially those outlined by the CDC and other international medical experts. These recommendations that we keep hearing about, and need to follow, are for our physical health. However, what about our emotional and spiritual health? Where can we find comfort for this side of the equation?

As a theologian, for spiritual/emotional health, I turn to Psalm 91 for support. For in Psalm 91, the Psalmist writes, "Surely He (God) will save you from the fowler's snare and the deadly pestilence. He will cover you with his feathers, and under His wings, you will find refuge; His faithfulness will be your shield and rampart. You will not fear the terror of night, nor the arrow that flies by day, nor the pestilence that stalks in the darkness, nor the plague that destroys at midday. A thousand may fall at your side, ten thousand at your right hand, but it will not come near you. You will only observe with your eyes and see the punishment of the wicked. If you say, 'The Lord is my refuge,' and you make the Most High your dwelling, no harm will overtake you, no disaster will come near your tent." (Psalm 91:3-10) In other words, our belief is also a shield. A shield from what? From panic and emotional distress.

Consequently, while it is essential that we listen to the experts in the medical field, it is also essential that we listen to our own religions so that we can calm our souls through our relationship with God. For the two together (medical and spiritual healing) have the ability to treat both body and soul. Both of these being essential in light of the Coronavirus and the challenges that lay in front of us as individuals and as a society in the days and weeks to come.

If we are speaking of challenges in front of us, we must answer the question if being responsible equates to being my brother's keeper. In the biblical story of Cain and Abel, God asks Cain after he murders his brother, "Where is your brother Abel?" "I don't know," he replied. "Am I my brother's keeper?" (Genesis 4:9) This verse and the story of Cain and Abel is one whereby another human being, in this case, a sibling, didn't consider his true brother an ally, rather he saw him as a threat. In today's world of "competitive toilet paper and water purchasing" Olympics, we need to ask the same question; are we our brother's keeper? If yes, then we must look out for those in need of assistance and those who can all too easily get pushed aside by the inward isolationism that we seem to be easily embracing.

How can we stop this trend towards forgetting about our neighbors, friends, and even the "strangers amongst us?" The first step is understanding that Social Distancing doesn't mean Social Isolationism. With social distancing, we are wanting to maintain a safe distance from others to stop or slow down the spread of a highly contagious disease. While social distancing is encouraged during this time, social isolationism is not. Social distancing should not stop us from remaining in contact with one another through calls, texts, emails, and other forms of communication. While Social Distancing may help cure, social isolationism speeds up social depression and all that follows alongside with it. We must not let COVID-19 turn us into modern-day Cain's.

King David in the Book of Psalms, said that "the world is built on kindness." (Psalm 89:3) The word for "kindness" is "Chesed" and it implies reaching out to others with love and generosity. The Talmud says that baseless hatred brought about the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem. We can't allow this same sort of negative attitude that destroyed the Temple to return to today's world through social isolationism. Rather, we must rebuild society, as the Jews did after the destruction of the second temple with community and kindness. For it is these values that have served as the foundations of unity no matter the headwinds of history. It is time that we find the "Chesed" within us and fight back the isolationistic feelings that threaten to drown us at this most critical of times. For the "Chesed" of our global community, it is the true key to defeating the Coronavirus.

May God bless and protect us now and forevermore.

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I sincerely hope that at some time during the past eight years I have managed to provide you with some form of guidance, assistance, comfort, or friendship. The time spent at Congregation Ahavath Sholom seems to have slipped by, as quickly as the blink of an eye.

This is the time of year that we seem to concentrate on Passover, the memories from childhood, the routines that families establish, the foods we elect not to eat, and those we feel compelled to eat. Passover has a way of pulling youthful memories to the forefront, but for now, it will remain unspoken. This year, as a result of recommendations of the Center for Disease Control and local health department directives, we at CAS cannot host a second night Seder. As a matter of course, many families are also forgoing the first night as a way of providing protection for their family and guests. We are distancing ourselves from others, in space, to avoid contagion, but not in communication. Services are still conducted, but virtually, and one can find any synagogue streaming their service. Often the service has been recorded and one can visit many congregations without leaving the comfort of their home and view (and participate) in a virtual service.

Naturally, we can always pray alone. Words of self-comfort may be uttered in isolation, one may put on a tallit and teffilim in the morning, a memory I have of my grandfather, or just sit quietly and say whatever is in one's heart.

Although I will no longer have the ability to adjust the temperature at CAS or inform you of activities that may be scheduled, I am certain that we shall run into each other in a restaurant, or grocery store. Saying good-bye is never an easy thing to do.

Shalom and Best Wishes. I hope this message finds you and your family well in all respects.

So much has changed so quickly. My routine opening sentence in this monthly column has changed from the superficial to the serious. We are all worried about the spread of infection, supply chains that re-stock our home pantries and refrigerators, our investments, and the impact of social distancing. Some of these worries are real. Other worries are based on rumor and information that has been misinterpreted. There is an endless stream of information on television and the internet. No need to rehash the news reports here.

Classic advice still appears relevant: concentrate on what you can impact while placing a lower emphasis on things you cannot control. You cannot control foolish statements made by government officials from podiums. You can seek out the opinions of scientists and medical experts who provide objective assessments. You cannot stop someone from telling you rumors about upcoming shortages. You can control your responses and not over-react. You cannot control the rollout of government rules that limit crowd size and essentially forces people to stay at home. You can reach out to isolated family members, friends, and neighbors to ease the impact.

In addition to actions we can each, personally control, we can take advantage of the synagogue's resources. We have an organization of caring individuals ready to help one another. It's been this way for over 125 years. You may have already viewed our internet broadcasts of weekday and Shabbat services. This is very important to many congregants. Thank you, Rabbi Bloom and Hazzan Weber. You may have already received a telephone call by a Board member or another congregant and been asked "How are you doing? How can I help?". We set up a free internet service that enables committees to easily communicate. Thank you, Melissa and David. While our building has been closed to all visitors, our Rabbi, Hazzan, and synagogue staff have continued to come to work to provide services to our congregants. We have used this closure to thoroughly clean the building and work on important projects we could otherwise address in a crowded building. Thank you, Michael, Suzi, Cameron, Maria, Gabriel, Tony, and Raphael.

So let's be optimistic and creative. Look at this time as an opportunity to purge your closets, attics, and those drawers that are seldom opened, complete your income taxes, get rid of old magazines and novels that you will realistically never read again, write a letter to your cousin, learn something new, dust off a book you bought but never read, throw out your old school notebooks and your freshman English 1.0 textbook, but most importantly, call someone on that old fashion device called a telephone. I intend to complete each of these tasks during the next 4 weeks.


