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FROM OUR RABBI



We often pray for calm waters and times ahead, for who wants to be on a ship in rough waters? Personally, I can tell you that the one time we were on a cruise I was incredibly happy that the ocean was calm. However, calming waters are

not always in front of us, the perfect example being the COVID-19 tempest that we find ourselves in. The question being, how do we deal with such a tempest?

Undoubtedly, Helen Keller dealt with many tempests that tested her character throughout her lifetime. Upon being asked about this, she said; "Character cannot be developed in ease and quiet. Only through experience of trial and suffering can the soul be strengthened, ambition inspired, and success achieved." (Helen Keller)

Although, Keller is not alive today, her words are as fitting for our present circumstances as they were when she wrote them. So, although, "The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The second-best time is now" (Chinese Proverb) In other words, this ancient proverb is telling us that we can't look backwards to define retroactively who we are today. Rather, we must plant our trees of character at this moment in time. Thus, helping plant the life sustaining moral forest for future generations to come.

The only problem with planting at this time is, we cannot leave the house to plant or garden. When our normal routine is altered, we must look for metaphors to learn from, instead of the actual doing which teaches us through life experience. Usually, at these times of inner reflection, we begin to think about things that we have done, should have done, wished we had done, and would like to do. This includes the planting of the trees that we are now metaphorically speaking about. Unfortunately, we often get inside our own heads and thus become frozen in place due to these thoughts.

I believe that one of the lessons we can learn from the Israelites wandering for 40 years in the desert has to do with also being frozen in place. The generation that left Egypt only knew the life of a slave and were unable to transform themselves into freethinking individuals. Consequently, at difficult times during their 40 years in the desert they tried to return to Egypt. Their inability to adapt precipitated their own deaths. On the other hand, Joshua was able to adapt and thereby saw what was truly in the Land of Israel. Thereby, he was able to enter it.

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If we were to translate the lessons of Joshua and our current situation into a metaphor for our own lives, I believe that we should construct these metaphors around the words of Theodore Roosevelt. Roosevelt said, "It is hard to fail but it is worse never to have tried to succeed." This is without doubt true. It is in this light, that while we are pondering our inner thoughts that I suggest we listen to the words of Mark Twain. For Twain framed the time in front of us by saying, "Twenty years from now you will be more disappointed by the things that you didn't do than by the ones you did do. So, throw off the bowlines, sail away from the safe harbor, Catch the trade winds in your sails. Explore. Dream. Discover."

Unfortunately, even in our dreams and the metaphors we live within, we are all running like "chickens with our heads cut off" without looking around to see where we're going. With the pandemic of COVID-19 still among us, even if it seems to be lessening, there are still warnings and guidelines being issued. Consequently, it feels like we are all running at supersonic speed, especially over the debate of reopening our institutions (although I think that getting a haircut is a unanimous yes), including the shul. However, were we not taught that we need to learn to walk before we run? Of course we were, and in light of our need to breath and walk again, I offer up this moving poem below for us all to meditate upon.

The poem is a reminder that if we open our eyes again to the reality around us, we will see the holiness that has always been there. Thus, giving us the strength to continue walking forward in times like today, one step at a time. The poem was written by Rob Bell and is called, "Walk Don't Run."

"Walk, don't run.
That's it.
Walk, don't run.
Slow down, breathe deeply,
and open your eyes because there's
a whole world right here within this one.

The bush doesn't suddenly catch on fire, it's been burning the whole time. Moses is simply moving slowly enough to see it. And when he does, he takes off his sandals. Not because the ground has suddenly become holy, but because he's just now becoming aware that the ground has been holy the whole time.

Efficiency is not God's highest goal for your life, neither is busyness, or how many things you can get done in one day, or speed, or even success.

But walking, which leads to seeing, now that's something. That's the invitation for every one of us today, and every day, in every conversation, interaction, event, and moment: to walk, not run. And in doing so, to see a whole world right here within this one."

Let us walk together in the light of God, for within it, we will find His protection and our unity. For as the Psalmist teaches us, "How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!" (Psalm 133:1)

And, if you signed up for the Poached Salmon dinner you got the best deal in town. Maria and her team really did an outstanding job.

Finally, we are looking at all aspects of reopening the Shul. It is not as easy as it sounds. Your safety is our primary concern. Arthur Moses is collaborating with Rabbi Bloom to come up with a plan and the tools we need to make this work. I want you to know that for many of us this will not be business as usual. And, this is going to last until there is a vaccine we can all get. We want you to be around for a long, long time.

When Will the CAS Building Open?

The CAS building on Hulen has been closed to everyone except essential personnel since March. On a daily basis, we have been watching the news and reaching out to experts about the status of the pandemic and the best course of action. Opinions have been received from all levels of government, the CDC and both local medical experts and leaders.

We have a great desire to open our doors and resume full operations immediately. Sadly, this is cannot be the case. The risk of a resurgence is significant and our membership fits a high risk profile. Thus, we have chosen to continue the current limitations until at least June 15. An exception may be an earlier opening of the south wing of the building to the operations of the Lil Goldman Early Childhood Center.

We have not been idle. In addition to collecting information, we had the building professionally cleaned and disinfected in early May. We have begun monitoring the temperature of all staff and clergy entering the building each day and some personnel have been frequently working from home. We have also developed detailed plans for maintaining a safe environment when the building is finally opened.

We want to open the building as soon as possible. We will let you know when this can safely happen.
