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# FROM OUR RABBI



Many of us lead hectic and stressful lives. To alleviate some of the stress of everyday life, we try to find that which calms our bodies and our souls. Some of us work out at a gym. Others alleviate their stress through any

number of hobbies. The most important thing is that we each find something in which we love to participate.

One of the ways that I have found comfort on many occasions in the past is through singing zmirot (songs) and nigunim (melodies). One of my favorite songs is one of the most poetic and beautiful love songs that I have ever encountered. It is so beautiful that many brides walk down to their chuppah (wedding canopy) with this song in the background. The song is titled Erev Shel Shoshanim (Night of Roses). Written by Moshe Dor, it reads:

An evening of roses. Let us go out to the orchard. Myrrh, spices, and frankincense shall be as a threshold for your feet.

The night comes upon us slowly and a breeze of roses is blowing.

Let me whisper a song to you quietly, a song of love.

It is dawn, a dove is cooing. Your hair is filled with dew.

Your lips are like a rose to the morning.

I'll pick it for myself.

To me, this song talks about love between a man and a woman, a boyfriend and girlfriend, a husband and wife, or two committed partners. This song evokes the feeling of love, not only for the outer beauty of a partner but also for that person's inner beauty. This song touches me because it sings about the beauty and wonders of nature.

These wonders are found in the beauty of the roses, spices, night breeze, and the beauty of a dove. The song speaks to the beauty of both human beings and the natural world. Finally, I find the description of the twilight hours to be spectacular.

I often ask myself, "Why am I more attracted to this song than to others?" The answer is; because the relationship in this song is more than a bond between two people. It is also a connection between God and us.

When thinking about our relationship with God (both on an individual and communal level), I immediately think about how I start my day each morning with the davening of Scharait. Within the service, in the morning blessings directly preceding the Mourners Kaddish and P'sukei D'Zimra (Verses of Songs), Psalm 30 is chanted. This Psalm is credited to David and dedicated to the Temple. It is centered on the theme of God's deliverance of the individual in times of distress.

Words of redemption and the divine grace of God towards the individual author can be found in numerous verses. Such as, "Adonai, I cried out and You healed me. You saved me from the pit of death... You transformed my mourning into dancing, my sackcloth into robes of joy – that I might sing Your praise unceasingly, that I might than You, Adonai my God, forever." (Psalm 30 vs. 3-4, 1-13)

Looking closely at these verses, we can understand a multitude of emotions that the author was feeling at the time he spoke them. In my mind, it makes sense that he had just gone through an extreme period of danger (physical, emotional, or spiritual) and now has been saved.

Having come through this danger, the writer is trying to relay the conclusion of his experience to the reader. This conclusion being, that in times of trouble and travail, only the power of God in combination with man's belief could have pulled him through the lifechanging event that he just experienced.

Moreover, we could conclude that the author's belief has strengthened for having survived such an ordeal, for had it already been strong, there would have been no need to write such a *Psalm of deliverance*. The conclusion that I will mention stems from this *Psalm* is personal and relates to each one of us.

Being that we too go through hard and stressful times during our lives, and with the power of belief, we can also survive the trials and tribulations that we face. In difficult times, just as the famous poem Footsteps in the Sand teaches us, it is not that we are walking alone through life. During the hard times, it is God who is carrying us. Thus allowing us to move forward, even when all we want to do is to lie down, curl up, and hide from the world.

May the stresses in our lives be few and the roses aplenty.

# FROM OUR HAZZAN



This past Jewish Holy Day season, while extremely meaningful, has been both an opportunity to connect with our traditions and prayers and experience things in a brand-new way. We had to have the vision to figure out how to have a meaningful spiritual experience while dealing with the challenges of not be able to be together physically in large numbers. We had to have the vision of using technology in ways we have not

done so before now. We had to have the vision of figuring out how to alter the prayer services so that it would still include what we all needed textually and spiritually while finding ways to shorten services due to the reality of screen fatigue. Most of us have difficulty to keep interested while watching the services only on our computer screens, without the actual contact of being with others physically in a sacred prayer space. All of this took much planning and vision. In addition to the above, I experienced things in a manner different from the usual, which I would like to share with you now.

Earlier in the season, I had a relatively simple and common procedure on one of my eyes. Things were going beautifully until shortly before Rosh Hashana. I ended up having a severely adverse reaction to the treatment and, unfortunately, ended up with extreme discomfort and almost total lack of vision in that eye. Fortunately, it is getting better now.

The stress and anguish that goes through one's mind, knowing that these most important Holy Days are upon us, and not knowing how I might be able to get through leading services, was something that I have never experienced before. I was not able to have the physical vision and focus needed but had to find the inner "vision" nonetheless. We are people of faith. I knew that I needed to keep that faith close to my heart, even more than usual, to have this High Holy Days be that meaningful time for us all.

Praying is not always about the exact words of the sacred texts, but about the spirit and emotion, they are meant to bring to us. That is where the idea of the niggun, a prayer in song without words (yai di dai dai ...), comes from. We need to feel it deep inside. As Hazzan, I need to feel it in that manner and share that with the community, so we can all go on the same "ride" together. How would I be able to keep my focus with such distractions from my physical situation at the time? How would I be able to help bring the community along on my spiritual, emotional, and musical journey in the manner it should be done? This cannot simply be a performance. It must be real. It would have to be made possible with the help of our prayers, traditions, faith, and of course, the love and support of my family. In the High Holy Days Musaf service, there is a prayer which was a perfect answer for me when I felt doubt; "Ochila La'eil." I will share with you now the translation of that text. I hope it can help you if there is a trying time.

"I place my hope in God; I pray for God's compassion. I ask of God the gift of expression, that here amidst his flock, I might sing praises of God's power, chant songs of joy in God's works. Man's thoughts are his own, but the gift of expression comes from God. Open my mouth, O Lord, that my lips may proclaim your praise. May the words of my mouth and the meditations of my heart be acceptable to you, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer."

May this be a year of strength, health, and happiness for us all.

October has come to a close; it's officially autumn for me once we experience the time change! The "new normal" continued in October – with a few glimpses to the other side of the pandemic... Needles & Nosh in person outside, the Men's Club & Ladies Auxiliary hosting a speaker from Johnson County Distillery, Book Club meetings, a Bar Mitzvah, Bark and Bless: Bless-



ing of the Animals, clean-up of the storage shed, and the regularly scheduled committee meetings. And more importantly, the LEC's returning to in-person/hybrid classes. These moments are what brings a community together and keeps us together. You'll read about more ways CAS is working for the community in this bulletin – like pumpkin soup, outdoor Kabbalat Shabbat with the band, and family zoom Shabbat service.

We've also had the "normal" issues of maintaining a forty-year-old building. (Brick and mortar don't care about the coronavirus!). On the second day of Rosh Hoshana, the HVAC unit that cools the west side of the Barnett Sanctuary created an indoor rain shower. An emergency call to Harold James Inc. revealed a costly leak in the evaporator coil. The HVAC unit was replaced to ensure the health and welfare of Rabbi Bloom, Hazzan Weber, and the congregants attending Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur in person. A week later, the other HVAC unit in the Barnett Sanctuary decided to do the same thing. Both AC units are/were 2000 models; one has been replaced while the other is awaiting replacement, most likely in the spring before we will need it.

You may have noticed Cameron's work to improve and streamline your Shabbat Shalom email and CAS news. In addition, we are now able to text rather than call you through our automated phone system. An automated call notified of opt-in information. We will continue to try ways to reach the community and make it better and easier for you to feel connected to CAS.

And when we can gather for Shabbat, know that Maria and I have figured out a way to hold the Kiddush luncheon (sponsor pending). We will keep you posted!

#### **LEARNING & ENGAGEMENT CENTER**



By the time you are reading this, we will be well into the second Jewish month of the year, Cheshvan. This month is sometimes called "Mar Cheshvan." If you are a Hebrew speaker, you might think this means "Mr. Cheshvan," but it's the other "mar," the one that means "bitter" (as in the maror-the bitter herbs -of Passover). The "bitterness" in this

case refers to the scarcity of holidays as compared to the first month of the Jewish year.

How will we make "bitter Cheshvan" into a sweet month?

Our first Family and Congregational Shabbat will be on Friday, November 13th. The services will be led by Rabbi, Hazzan on guitar, student volunteers, and Margo Wagner, our ISJL intern. (ISJL is our very comprehensive Judaica curriculum, written and provided by the Goldring/Woldenberg Institute of Southern Jewish Life.) I hope to see you all there!

On Sunday, November 15th, we will be planting daffodils at the synagogue entrance for the third year in a row. This is a bittersweet occasion. The daffodils are part of a national project to memorialize the 1.5 million children who perished in the Holocaust. In the past two years, the school has already planted 500 daffodils, and we are going to plant another 250. We will be able to appreciate their yellow-star

shaped beauty in the spring, as the flowers bloom.
Although we will remember a horrific event in history, it will be a sweet month of learning and engagement at the school.

> In Flanders Fields By John McCrae

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie, In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields

### ON SITE SERVICES INFORMATION

We're looking forward to seeing everyone as we phase into in-person meetings at CAS. At the same time, we want to ensure that we do this as safely and cautiously as is needed to protect human life by not spreading COVID-19.

#### WHAT TO EXPECT



**CLEANING:** Cleaning and sanitizing will occur prior to and following Minyan and Shabbat services in the Barnett Sanctuary. Bathrooms will be cleaned daily with additional surface cleaning during Shabbat services.

FACE MASKS: You will be required to wear facial covering (covers both nose and mouth) unless medical necessity dictates or you are under 2 years old.



**PEWS:** Every third row is open. Please sit only as a household family unit with three seats between you and the next family unit.



**ARRIVAL:** When you arrive, please enter through the north doors. You will be provided a mask to wear if you do not have personal facial covering. You are asked to use hand sanitizer at the door. Ushers will assist with seating for Shabbat services.

You will register your attendance (in case a COVID-19 case arises). **EXITING:** Visiting with your friends and family is encouraged **OUTSIDE** the building. Ushers will dismiss by row beginning with the rear and moving forward.
