FROM OUR RABBI



The phrase, "I am searching for myself," is one that all of us have heard and most likely uttered at one time or another in our lives. This is due to the fact that it is natural

during our lives to be looking for a path forward towards something new or just looking to consolidate our own identities. At one time, our ancestors traveled throughout the fields and countryside to find food for survival, while today, we travel through life searching for personal nourishment. Both of these searches are integral to our survival.

Alongside our search, we often run into many different experiences that change our paths. One of those experiences is spiritual enlightenment. It often occurs when we look up from the path we are walking and stare at the infinite landscape ahead of us. For, "And ye shall seek Me (God), and find Me when ye shall search for Me with all your heart." (Jeremiah 29:13) In other words, God is just waiting alongside our pathways with open arms for those who seek Him.

Additionally, we can add to this the words of Wayne Dyer. Dyer is an Internationally renowned Self-Help Author and Motivational speaker who has authored more than 21 NYT Best Selling books. Among those books, one of his most famous quotes is, "Be miserable. Or motivate yourself. Whatever must be done, it's always your choice." In other words, our outcomes are based on our choices. Now imagine if we were to combine both God's blessings and our own decisions to be motivated. The outcome of these two together would allow us to grow as individuals and members of our communities. I believe that in the end, the decision is our own. However, we must realize that God has given us all the tools to succeed, and all we need is faith in ourselves and Him. Once we accomplish this, then we will be able to recite the words, "The Lord has done it this very day; let us rejoice today and be glad." (Psalm 118:24)

FROM OUR HAZZAN



Shabbat Nachamu: Can you "Handel" it?

Some of the greatest music has come from our ancient texts and liturgies. Shabbat Nachamu is the time when we are seeking comfort. We have just come from Tisha B'av when we immerse ourselves deeply in the realities of human suffering and the brokenness of our world.

That was the date of the fall of both the First and the Second Temple, as well as many other tragedies and traumas throughout history. We are now in need of comfort and healing.

Music is a great healer and, for me, a path to being a spiritual human being. For years I sang in choirs and as a soloist and performed so many great pieces of music. Some of my favorite musical moments as a musician were spiritual moments that I hadn't thought about at the time.

The text of the Haftarah for Shabbat Nachamu is the source of some of this great music. What comes to my mind first is the music of the great Composer, George Frideric Handel, and his oratorio, Handel's Messiah. When I look at the beginning of this haftarah, what pops into my musical mind immediately is three great compositions I have had the great pleasure of performing. First, there is the recitative "Comfort Ye, Comfort Ye My People, saith Your God. Speak Ye Comfortably to Jerusalem, and cry unto her that her warfare is pardoned...". Interestingly enough, now that I live in Texas and started to look at the Hebrew grammar of this text, the opening text is rather suitable. The word Nachamu is in the plural. It means that instead of it saying just "comfort ye," it really would translate to something more like, "Y'all offer comfort."

Next in this composition, the text continues with the Aria, "Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill make low. The crooked straight and the rough places plain." This is also taken directly from this haftarah. Listening to the music, you will hear that the composer has helped to paint a picture with the phrases and musical intervals up and down to go along with the text.

Finally, there is the great choir piece, "And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed." I love how Handel chose to switch to a choir setting for this part of the text. I can't ever really know what he was thinking, but for me, it indicates that the Lord shall be revealed not only to an individual but to everyone as individuals and as the larger community.

All of this great music comes from just the first five lines of this haftarah, Isaiah chapter 40, verses 1-5. Music is the great connection between people, spirit, and all that the earth holds.

At the beginning of the year, Rivka Marco and several teachers helped me deliver care packages to all our students. Going beyond the beginning of the school year, Rivka Marco and Rebecca Isgur volunteered to manage the school because they cared about the synagogue. They did this for two years!

When our school was online at the beginning of the year, Rich and Terri Hollander shared their time and recipes. With their help, we made care packages with dough, sprinkles, and honey to send home. We got together virtually to knead and braid complicated round challahs for Rosh Hashanah under Rich's tutelage (picture below).



When our school started meeting in person, Dan Sturman and several others from the Men's Club were kind enough to prepare students and parents a boxed hot dog lunch. (A favorite with the kids.)

Some of the hard work in the daffodil garden was done by our 'congregant with tools', Arthur Moses. Arthur helped dig up the overgrowth. He also hung up the plaque to commemorate the daffodils that are a memorial for the children murdered in the Holocaust.

For Chanukah, Rich and Terri taught our students how to make sufganiyot, deep-fried Chanukah doughnuts. (The recipe and ingredients were sent home for our online students.) What a delight it was to eat fresh sufganiyot to remind us of the miracles God has done for our ancestors and us!

Dan Sturman and the Men's Club sponsored our Mother's Day lunch and cookie making. Maria made a whole lot of dough. (We had so much dough, we were able to make 10 Commandment cookies the following week as well.) Rich and Terri made fresh bagels for lunch.

The Membership Committee's May Events, Coffee Under the Canopy, gave parents and other congregants a place to gather outside the synagogue and schmooze.

Dan Sturman (pictured right-wearing his hot dog hat) again came through to help us along with Foster Owen, the new synagogue President. They made a hot dog lunch for the LEC to enjoy outdoors together before we all departed for the summer.

In preparing for next year, Terri Hollander spent two days with me cleaning out 40 years' worth of Sunday school material. Although much of

the material needed buried, recycled, or thrown out, through Terri's efforts, we will be able to donate a sizable pile of books and miscellaneous items.

There will be many more volunteer opportunities in the new school year. I hope that if you are able, you join your fellow congregants in fulfilling the mitzvah of gemilut chasadim.






HIGH HOLY DAY INFORMATION


perform and share the mitzvah of Tikkun Olam.




Connecting Resources Information

THINK ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

According to the updated CDC guidelines as of May 13, 2021, those who are fully vaccinated (two weeks following their 2nd dose of the Pfizer, Moderna, or Astra-Zeneca COVID vaccination, or two weeks following their one dose of the J & J/Janssen COVID vaccination) may safely resume most activities done prior to the pandemic without wearing a mask. Exceptions are hospitals and health care facilities, public transportation and public transportation hubs/depots, jails/prisons, and homeless shelters. Those who are not fully vaccinated should remain masked indoors.

11 for effective March 10, 2021, lifting some of the restrictions, but he encouraged continued social distancing. CAS requires continued social distancing (6 ft from those outside your household).

Here are the new guidelines to enter the building:

- No temperature check is required.
- Unvaccinated and those not fully vaccinated are required to wear a mask that covers the nose and mouth. Fully vaccinated persons may opt to wear masks according to their comfort levels. No mask is required for those two weeks following the final COVID vaccination (see above).
- Distancing is required indoors. We will continue to keep six feet from those living outside your household while you are indoors.
- We ask that you continue to sign in (according to current hallachick guidelines regarding the pandemic, Rabbi Bloom gives dispensation) so that we have contact tracing should a COVID case appear.

ON SITE SERVICES INFORMATION

We're looking forward to seeing everyone as we phase into in-person meetings at CAS. At the same time, we want to ensure that we do this as safely and cautiously as is needed to protect human life by not spreading COVID-19.

WHAT TO EXPECT



CLEANING: Cleaning and sanitizing will occur prior to and following Minyan and Shabbat services in the Barnett Sanctuary. Bathrooms will be cleaned daily with additional surface cleaning during Shabbat services.

FACE MASKS: Unvaccinated and those not fully vaccinated are required to wear a mask that covers the nose and mouth. Fully vaccinated persons may opt to wear masks



according to their comfort levels. No mask is required for those two weeks following the final COVID vaccination (details in the "Think About Your Health" section).

PEWS: Every other row is open. Please sit only as a household family unit with three seats between you and the next family unit.



ARRIVAL: When you arrive, please enter through the north doors. You are asked to use hand sanitizer at the door. You will register your attendance (in case a COVID-19 case arises). **EXITING:** Visiting with your friends and family is encouraged **OUTSIDE**

the building.
