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
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others through the words of conversations? Maybe we should put down our books, texts, tweets, etc., and begin talking to each other, just like in the "old days." Isn't it time for this? This guestion is asked time and time again by individuals towards one another, between families that might not be on the closest of terms, and even by foreign foes. In other words, when is it time to find a common ground of mutual interests and start a dialogue towards better relationships? This question is an essential component in forming better friendships and alliances on all levels throughout life.

Robert Frost wrote about this very subject in his poem, "A Time to Talk." His poem reads:

"When a friend calls to me from the road

And slows his horse to a meaning walk, I don't stand still and look around On all the hills I haven't hoed, And shout from where I am, What is it? No, not as there is a time to talk. I thrust my hoe in the mellow ground, Blade-end up and five feet tall, And plod: I go up to the stone wall For a friendly visit."

Frost's supposition that when a friend calls, we put down our hoes and come over. I would like to widen the definition in our case from friend to foe. In other words, when a foe calls us over, we need to put down our hoes to talk and transform them into friends. By doing this, we are fulfilling the verse in Isaiah, "And they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruninghooks: nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war (perpetuate difficult relationships) anymore" (Isaiah 2:4).


Let us listen to both Frost and Isaiah and answer the calls to friendship by putting down our hoes and coming to the wall for a conversation. However, let us not stop there, but let us also be the ones who call others. For, the coming together of friends, both old and new, is what will bring wholeness and holiness into our world. Finally, we must ask, besides friendships and coming together, can we find holiness in other places? For this will allow us to become whole and holy on multiple levels.

This question of finding holiness is universal in the manner and particular in theology. More importantly, the individual search for holiness gives meaning to our individual lives. Thereby, our searches for holiness are both communal and personal.

Above we stated that friendships and conversations bring about holiness. On a communal path, I think we can find our answer in a quote by Colonel Walter Elliot. He said, "The desert has its holiness of silence, the crowd its holiness of conversation." In other words, holiness is nowhere and everywhere at the same time.

So, let us start looking by engaging in conversations and friendships, for in this manner, we might find the map towards communal holiness together. Thereby, instead of trying to find a path forward, we will be blazing towards a better future.

FROM OUR HAZZAN



During the second week of October, we will usher in the month of Cheshvan, also referred to as Marcheshvan. It is common knowledge that the second name developed from the first. The word אָשרור," was added to אַשרור because it is the only month in the Jewish calendar with absolutely no holidays or other out-of-the-ordinary days — not even a

fasting day.

I had always been told this to be fact and common knowledge. I just assumed it was correct, but sometimes common knowledge is wrong.

When we examine the linguistic facts, the "popular" explanation of the name אַרְהֶשְׁנוֹן turns out to be nothing but a charming folk etymology. The true origin of the name is interesting. The following is a translated paraphrase of a discussion of אַמְרָהֶשְׁנוֹן N. H. Tur-Sinai, a major Israeli scholar of Hebrew and the Bible (1886–1973):

It is this alternative system that accounts for the name מַרְהֶשְּׁעָן. The first, a pronunciation issue. In Babylon, the pronunciation of the letter mem and vav (which was at the time still pronounced like the English letter "w") was reversed. Both letters are pronounced with the two lips, and this accounts for their reversal in Babylon. The name that gave rise, through this pronunciation, to אָמָרְהָשְׁעָן "eight-month." בוּה שְׁמִרְנָה שְׁמִינִי, "eight-month." יֻרָה שְׁמִרְנָה "counting from Nisan).

So, it is אַרְהֶשְׁנֵן athat is the month's original name, and אָנְהָשְׁנֵן is just a shortened version.

Personally, I understand the original idea of it being sad that there are no "special" days during this month. On the other hand, as the person who leads most of the services here in our congregation, I have to say that it isn't all that sad to have to do only "regular" things sometimes as well.

May all our days be special.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I wanted to give our congregation a brief update on our long-term plans for the synagogue's building. We recognize the cost of maintaining and repairing our 40+-year-old building continues to increase each year during a time when our membership has declined. The building was designed for a 400 + family membership/ congregation in late 1979.



The exploratory building committee has been diligently working on these issues for the past few years. Many groups/congregants have been involved in these meetings and conversations to garner information from all our members as to prioritize our wants and needs.

As President, I wanted to show you all that the committee has accomplished. After a stringent review of 15 highly respected architectural design firms, the committee unanimously selected an outstanding, award-winning architectural firm to help guide us through our facilities assessment. Next, we completed a second formal assessment of the building to understand its current physical status and help project future maintenance costs. This news was not the best. The engineering report clearly stated that the building needs significant renovation and repairs. These repairs and multi renovations could cost many hundreds of thousands of dollars over the next five years. These repairs and renovations include better security features, new insulation, a fire sprinkler system, a new roof, and possibly a dozen heating and air conditioning units.

Our congregation will need to decide whether to continue to pay for these repairs and replacements as each comes up sporadically and unexpectedly or what type of renovations are required to facilitate our immediate needs. There are options to do very large renovations that could bring new uses to our existing building and facilities for our congregation. Of course, there are also options for building a new structure/building with costs involved for the different scenarios. We had already planned a congregational meeting to present the engineering report and preview options by the architects in August 2021. Unfortunately, that meeting was postponed due to our current COVID situation. We anticipate having this educational and informative session sometime in the upcoming months when it is safer to gather in a large group. We hope to keep everyone well informed as to our possibilities and options in front of our congregation.

We will look forward to these presentations and activities to keep you included in this important endeavor with more to share in the future.

FROM OUR ADMINISTRATOR









THINK ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

According to the updated **CDC guidelines of August 13, 2021,** to maximize protection from the Delta variant and prevent possibly spreading it to others, wear a mask indoors in public if you are in an **area of substantial or high transmission**. Tarrant County is currently a high transmission area.

The CDC in currently recommends the use of masks for ALL persons indoors, regardless of vaccination status. Congregation Ahavath Sholom is taking a stronger stand on masking: we REQUIRE masks in all common areas, including the entry, Sanctuary, restrooms, and hallways for ALL PERSONS over the age of 2 years old. CAS requires continued social distancing (6 ft from those outside your household).

Here are the guidelines to enter the building:

- No temperature check is required.
- All persons regardless of vaccination status are required to wear a mask that covers the nose and mouth.
- Distancing is required indoors. We will continue to keep six feet from those living outside your household while you are indoors.
- We ask that you continue to sign in (according to current hallachick guidelines regarding the pandemic, Rabbi Bloom gives dispensation) so that we have contact tracing should a COVID case appear.

We are glad to have you back in person for services and activities. Know how much we value you and the community we share.

PLEASE REMEMBER...

Please remain home if you are experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms. Please use your best judgement in following the guidelines from the CDC. It is our responsibility to ensure the safety of all.

ON SITE SERVICES INFORMATION

We're looking forward to seeing everyone as we phase into in-person meetings at CAS. At the same time, we want to ensure that we do this as safely and cautiously as is needed to protect human life by not spreading COVID-19.

WHAT TO EXPECT



CLEANING: Cleaning and sanitizing will occur prior to and following Minyan and Shabbat services in the Barnett Sanctuary. Bathrooms will be cleaned daily with additional surface cleaning during Shabbat services.

FACE MASKS: You will be required to wear facial covering (covers both nose and mouth) in all common areas, including the entry, Sanctuary, restrooms, and hallways. This applies to ALL PERSONS over the age of 2 years old.



PEWS: Every other row is open. Please sit only as a household family unit with three seats between you and the next family unit.



ARRIVAL: When you arrive, please enter through the north doors. You will be provided a mask to wear if you do not have personal facial covering. You are asked to use hand sanitizer at the door. You will register your attendance (in case a COVID-

19 case arises). **EXITING:** Visiting with your friends and family is encouraged **OUTSIDE** the building.

WISH LIST

As many of you know, CAS applied for the Federal Non-Profit Security Grant in April. Award notifications were delivered to applicants in the middle of September. Unfortunately, we were not awarded any grant money this year. Of course we will apply again next year, but we have some security areas we would like to improve prior to the next potential award in September 2022.

- Our CAS doorbell and door release at the school entrance was the original, and it stopped working in April or May. Even with the help of our alarm company, it could not be repaired. We want to let you in without making you wait outside the door. (Approximate cost, \$700)
- We would like the additional safety of a mag-lock with keyless remote for our officer on Kabbalat Shabbat and Shabbat. The current lock system limits our officer to physical distance of the door when s/he may be needed further in the building or further out of the building. The mag-lock remote strengthens the lock and gives our officer mobility. (Approximate cost, \$900)
