CAS SELECTED AS U.S. MARINES TOYS FOR TOTS COLLECTION SITE



Perform The Mitzvah Of Helping Those In Need By Donating A New Unwrapped Toy.

Join us on December 5th for a Chanukah Program and community-wide event. Congregation Ahavath Sholom will serve as a Toys for Tots collection site for 2021! While we are all familiar with the program and have seen the events on the local news, this is the first time we will be a part of the Marines' toy drive.

The US Marines Toys for Tots program is a non-profit program created to help needy children receive new toys as a message of hope to motivate youngsters grow into responsible, productive, patriotic citizens and community leaders. The toys are distributed within the community in which they are collected. Although their fundraising activities happen throughout the year, their primary effort – and most profitable time – is in the months of October, November, and December.

DFW Toys for Tots approved the synagogue as a collection site in October, and you will find the Toy Dropbox in the Sanctuary entrance. To make our first effort an impactful effort, CAS is inviting Beth-El Congregation, Arborlawn United Methodist Church, Doxology Church, the Fort Worth Fine Arts Academy, Overton Park Elementary School, and the Jewish Federation of Fort Worth and Tarrant County to support the Toy Drive by attending our December 5th Chanukah Event!

We ask that you bring a new, unwrapped toy to Shul on December 5th when you come for the 6 pm Chanukah Program. We are working to make this one of the Toys for Tots Events, but have not received confirmation notice at this time. If it is a confirmed event, we will have the Marines here to accept the toys. The goal for CAS is 450 new, unwrapped toys for the US Marines Toys for Tots. Let's double it!

Toys will be collected throughout November and through December 9th. If you choose to participate, you may bring a new unwrapped toy to the dropbox any time.

The words "depressed" and "anxious" are two expressions we feel at times and undoubtedly hear others complain about. Luckily, in today's "psyche" centered society, there are many

places where we can seek out help when we feel anxious or depressed. However, what about helping ourselves?

To begin helping ourselves, we must start by examining our outlooks and inner thought processes. Often the way we think is directly connected to how we feel. Chinese Philosopher, Lao Tzu (6th Century BCE), wrote about this and said, "If you are depressed you are living in the past, if you are anxious you are living in the future, if you are at peace, you are living in the present." In other words, the prescription to finding balance and peace is by living in the present.

Religiously speaking, the Psalmist also spake about finding peace. However, he added one additional ingredient to Lao Tzu's philosophy, God. For, he wrote, "In peace, I will both lie down and sleep; for you alone, O Lord, make me dwell in safety" (Psalm 4:8). As we can see, both authors first step towards tranquility is by focusing on the "here and now."

Additionally, we can continue finding balance and light amongst the darkness through our beliefs and behavior. As the Psalmist wrote, "When the righteous cry for help, the Lord hears and delivers them out of all their troubles. The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit" (Psalm 34:17-18). In other words, we are never truly alone, for God's light is always within our grasp. We need to believe in this and behave/ live accordingly.

The perfect biblical example of overcoming darkness is Moses. For, he was a stutterer who was afraid to speak in public or lead others. However, when he came across the Burning Bush and embraced the light of God's fire, he became a leader of his people instead of a frightened follower. Thereby, as we know. "In Israel, there never arose another prophet like Moses, able to see God's likeness." (Yigdal Prayer) The key ingredients to Moses's obtaining this status were his belief in God and his inner strength to continuously grow as a human being.

I believe that we all have the same capabilities within ourselves. We need to search for and "see the light." One of those places to look is within is religion. Let us all find inspiration in our heritage, shared history, and common future.

CAS BUILDING EXPLORATORY COMMITTEE REPORT

The CAS Building Exploratory Committee has a brief update regarding its progress and the options for the longterm plans for the synagogue building. The Committee has been diligently working on this project for the past few years.

After a stringent review of fifteen highly respected architectural design firms, the Committee unanimously selected and the Board of Directors voted & approved retaining an outstanding, award-winning architectural firm, Lake Flato Architects, to help guide CAS through a facilities assessment.

A second formal assessment of the building was completed under the contract with Lake Flato Architects to assess and understand our current physical status and project future maintenance costs. The engineering report clearly stated that the building needs significant renovation and repairs that will cost over two million dollars (\$2,000,000) in the next five years. The repairs and renovations include better security features, new insulation, a fire sprinkler system, a new roof, and more than a dozen HVAC units.

The cost of maintaining and repairing our 40-year-old building continues to increase each year, during a time when membership has declined. The building, which is too large for our current membership, is not meeting our needs as a congregation.

The Committee cites the options available to the congregation are:

- 1. Do nothing and continue to pay for repairs.
- 2. Renovate the existing building.
- 3. Build a new building.

The Committee's short-term goal is to develop options for consideration by the Board. Any Board recommendation requiring significant expenditures will be presented to the CAS membership for review and approval.

The congregational meeting which was scheduled for August to present the engineering report and preview some options was postponed due to COVID. This educational session will be rescheduled for sometime after Chanukah when it is safer to gather in a large group. The Committee plans to have presentations and activities to include you in this important project.

Remember, the decision is for the members of the Congregation to make. The Exploratory Building Committee's task is to bring information to the Board of Directors and the Congregation. It is the Congregation's task to direct the architects on what we want to happen.

Was Alexander Hamilton Jewish?

Historian Andrew Porwancher debunks a string of myths about the origin of this founding father to arrive at the conclusion that Hamilton was likely born and raised Jewish.

Please join us for a special evening presentation on Monday, December 6th. Congregation Ahavath Sholom, Beth-El, Beth Israel, and Beth Shalom come together for a special community Zoom funded by the Jewish Federation of Fort Worth and Tarrant County.

Professor Porwancher, the Ernest May Fellow at Harvard and Wick Cary Associate Professor at the University of Oklahoma, will share why he believes Hamilton kept his Jewish upbringing in the Caribbean a secret when he moved to New York. His extensive research reveals important new information that upends the assumption that Hamilton was Christian.

By setting Hamilton in the context of his Jewish world, the author's fascinating new book, The Jewish World of Alexander Hamilton, challenges us to rethink the life and legend of America's most enigmatic founder, who championed the cause of both American and Jewish ideals. If you'd like to read the book before the Zoom, one copy is available to borrow from the CAS library or order from Amazon, Barnes & Noble, or Kindle.

The program starts promptly at 7:00 pm and will be preceded at 6:50 by an Alexander Hamilton trivia poll and our own Hazzan Jeffrey Weber singing Adon Olam to the tune of "You'll Be Back" from the Hamilton musical. During the Zoom presentation, the name of one person present online from CAS will be randomly drawn and receive a personally autographed copy of the book.

This free Zoom event is available to all members of the Tarrant County Jewish community and their guests. Preregistration is required. The link to register for this event is available on the Federation website or the Federation's Five Things Fast email.

THINK ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

According to the updated **CDC guidelines of August 13**, **2021**, to maximize protection from the Delta variant and prevent possibly spreading it to others, wear a mask indoors in public if you are in an **area of substantial or high transmission**. Tarrant County is currently a high transmission area.

The CDC in currently recommends the use of masks for ALL persons indoors, regardless of vaccination status. Congregation Ahavath Sholom is taking a stronger stand on masking: we REQUIRE masks in all common areas, including the entry, Sanctuary, restrooms, and hallways for ALL PERSONS over the age of 2 years old. CAS requires continued social distancing (6 ft from those outside your household).

Here are the guidelines to enter the building:

- No temperature check is required.
- All persons regardless of vaccination status are required to wear a mask that covers the nose and mouth.
- Distancing is required indoors. We will continue to keep six feet from those living outside your household while you are indoors.
- We ask that you continue to sign in (according to current hallachick guidelines regarding the pandemic, Rabbi Bloom gives dispensation) so that we have contact tracing should a COVID case appear.

We are glad to have you back in person for services and activities. Know how much we value you and the community we share.

PLEASE REMEMBER...

Please remain home if you are experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms. Please use your best judgement in following the guidelines from the CDC. It is our responsibility to ensure the safety of all.

ON SITE SERVICES INFORMATION

We're looking forward to seeing everyone as we phase into in-person meetings at CAS. At the same time, we want to ensure that we do this as safely and cautiously as is needed to protect human life by not spreading COVID-19.



WHAT TO EXPECT

CLEANING: Cleaning and sanitizing will occur prior to and following Minyan and Shabbat services in the Barnett Sanctuary. Bathrooms will be cleaned daily with additional surface cleaning during Shabbat services.

FACE MASKS: You will be required to wear facial covering (covers both nose and mouth) in all common areas, including the entry, Sanctuary, restrooms, and hallways. This applies to ALL PERSONS over the age of 2 years old.



PEWS: Every other row is open. Please sit only as a household family unit with three seats between you and the next family unit.



ARRIVAL: When you arrive, please enter through the north doors. You will be provided a mask to wear if you do not have personal facial covering. You are asked to use hand sanitizer at the door. You will register your attendance (in case a COVID-

19 case arises). **EXITING:** Visiting with your friends and family is encouraged **OUTSIDE** the building.

WISH LIST

As many of you know, CAS applied for the Federal Non-Profit Security Grant in April. Award notifications were delivered to applicants in the middle of September. Unfortunately, we were not awarded any grant money this year. Of course we will apply again next year, but we have some security areas we would like to improve prior to the next potential award in September 2022.

- Our CAS doorbell and door release at the school entrance was the original, and it stopped working in April or May. Even with the help of our alarm company, it could not be repaired. We want to let you in without making you wait outside the door. (Approximate cost, \$700)
- We would like the additional safety of a mag-lock with keyless remote for our officer on Kabbalat Shabbat and Shabbat. The current lock system limits our officer to physical distance of the door when s/he may be needed further in the building or further out of the building. The mag-lock remote strengthens the lock and gives our officer mobility. (Approximate cost, \$900)
