FROM OUR RABBI

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"Torah is not education, it's transformation" (Rebbitzen Dena Weinberg). From this quote, we can understand that to transform one's religious life we must embrace the study of religion and our sources. I

think the same can be said about our lives, professions, and interests. If we want to improve ourselves, we need to learn, read, and understand the rich history of educational literature and knowledge that is out there waiting for us to grasp.

Furthermore, transformation is not something that will suddenly come upon us. We have to go through personal growth to reach out to it. There is traditional Judaism teaching that says, "More Torah, more life." In other words, the more we embrace God and the knowledge that He bestowed upon us, the more meaningful and better our lives will be.

Today should be the day whereby we begin this transformation and consequently widen our education. I hope that we can transform ourselves further from the lesson below.


There is a competitive urge within individuals that pushes us to feel that we need to be number one and finish in the first place. Some people say, "Second place is only the first loser!" While this is one way, and at times an unhealthy way to look at this, Judaism teaches us something completely different.

As we know, the Torah starts with the letter Bet (which is the second letter in the Hebrew alphabet). Why? Because God's name, Adonai, begins with an Aleph (the first letter of the Hebrew Alphabet) and since God wrote the Torah and created mankind we will always be second/Bet to His Aleph. Subsequently, I don't believe God thinks of mankind as the "first loser," ultimately, we are His greatest gift.

Looking closer within the Torah, we can see that Moses, perhaps the greatest biblical figure, was not "number 1" either. He was the younger brother of Aaron and this didn't stop Moses from being chosen to lead the Children of Israel out of Egypt or stand on top of Mt. Sinai and receive the 10 Commandments. Similarly, Jacob was the younger twin of Esau, and he still went on to become the father of the 12 Tribes of Israel. As we can see, God didn't choose Moses and Jacob for pivotal roles in humanity because they were the first they were chosen because of their character and capabilities.

If the Torah teaches us that we will always be number 2 to God's number 1 and that success is not about placement but personality, shouldn't this enable us to see ourselves in a better light? Of course, it should! Please don't misunderstand and think that I don't believe in pushing for excellence and moving forward and upwards to the apex of one's capabilities and beyond. What I am saying is that we should never judge ourselves as 'first losers' in life. As the Torah taught us, the potential of man is within us and not contained within a number.

The Prince of Kosher Gospel

Question: Who is Joshua Nelson?

Answer: Our guest for MLK weekend - January 14-16, 2022

In his own words, "I know people are confused by my mix of gospel music and Jewish liturgical music, but that's precisely the point I try to make: both are about passion and

feeling and igniting the soul."

He was eight years old and growing up in a traditional Jewish home in Brooklyn — his mother is of Romanian Jewish descent, and his father is black and Jewish — when everything changed for Nelson. "I found an album of Mahalia Jackson music, and it stunned me. I'd never heard a sound like that or phrasing like that! I'd listen to that album every day."

By the time he was 12, the discovery that Joshua, the third child in a family of six, was indeed a singer with an amazing gift. People began to notice that he sounded like Mahalia. The family had relocated to the Newark/South Orange area, and Nelson had produced his first recording at the tender age of 13, choosing Mahalia Jackson's "How I Got Over." At 15, he sang at jazz singer Sarah Vaughan's funeral. "Nobody had to push me to sing — it was all I wanted to do."

Nelson has never questioned the unique blend of being an observant kosher Jewish family member — and a gospel singer — and instinctively knew it was the perfect fit for him. "People love to put everyone in boxes, even when it comes to religion. But I sensed, even as a kid, that I was a good Jew. The best Jew I could be ..."

Nelson also clarifies the misunderstanding that gospel music is strictly Christian music. "It was actually the music of West African slaves who used it to express whatever they were feeling."

Joshua Nelson has performed from Lincoln Center to synagogues in Europe and across the U.S, and to audiences that often are a mix of Jews and Baptists gathered to hear liturgy and soul. People dance in the aisles, and that's just how The Prince of Kosher Gospel likes it. "It's all about feeling, all about the deep emotion of spirituality. I want people to be participants, not spectators."

Says The Prince of Kosher Gospel, "Wherever and whenever I perform, it's always about an awakening of the spirit, and about connecting. Once, a woman told me that the evening gave her goose pimples. And I reminded her that it was actually her soul talking to her — and that's the best reaction we can hope for. When the soul talks, it's worth listening."

Nelson has performed with musical legends including Wynton Marsalis, Aretha Franklin, Stephanie Mills, and Billy Preston, as well as gospel singers Albertina Walker, the Barret Sisters, Hezekiah Walker, Kirk Franklin, Dottie Peoples, Dorothy Norwood, Vanessa Bell Armstrong, Reverend Timothy Wright, and Bobby Jones & New Life.

Nelson also frequently performs with the Jewish Klezmer band The Klezmatics. He has also performed with the late jazz greats Cab Calloway and Dizzy Gillespie.



CAS LEARNING AND ENGAGEMENT CENTER

We have been busy this month at the Learning and Engagement Center. We want to share with you all the activities that we have done! Our students are continuing their study of new Hebrew words and how to write them. We've had a Havdalah sing-along led by Hazzan Webber and Maya Kiselstein on the guitars.

Last month all our students took part in working outside to prepare our Daffodil Project garden for planting. Each student planted at least 1-2 daffodils, painted rocks, and laid their painted rocks in the ground next to them.



Thank you to all our teachers and students that helped remove all

the rocks and weeds and get the garden ready for planting. A special thanks to the Tinnin family and Ilan Kiselstein that helped us prepare the Daffodils planting site. We would also like to thank those who helped us plant the Daffodils: Foster Owen, Marvin Beleck, Marti Herman, and Linda Lavi.

In connection with the Daffodil Project, our students have been studying the concept of memory, remembering people who have died, the Jewish star of David, the yellow star, the symbolism of daffodils, and the resilience of the human spirit. The older students have also discussed the Holocaust and learned about real children who died. The LEC has dedicated 25 rocks in memory of children that perished in the Holocaust.

Our Madrichim class has been very active. They made bagels for the Family Shabbat on Friday, November 19th, with Mr. Rich Hollander and his wife Terri - Thank you so much! The group had an engaging class with Rabbi Bloom about the difference between Freedom Fighters and Terrorists in light of the Upcoming Holiday of Chanukah and the epic



story of Maccabees. They came out of the class with new insight and were very excited about the topic Rabbi Bloon discussed with them! (Thank you, Rabbi!)

The school has been preparing for the Cha-

nukah celebration that takes place on December 5th. Hazzan Weber has helped us rehearse the Chanukah songs that we will sing.



It hasn't been all work for our students. We took a break from class and gave the kids some time to shop for Chanukah gifts in the CAS Gift Shop. It was a pleasure and joy to see their happy faces.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

"Using his Pen, Herman Morris Made Us Think"

Herman I. Morris, a congregant, attorney, and civic gadfly, had a lifelong penchant for writing short, punchy letters-to-the-editor of every newspaper he read (and there were many). In his retirement, he methodically cut out each of the letters that made it into print and placed them in binders. Between 2005 and

his death in 2018 at age 91, his name appeared more than 200 times on the opinion pages of newspapers across Texas and New Mexico. Additionally, one letter was published in the Wall Street Journal, another in the Los Angeles Times, and four in the New York Times (plus a fifth in its online edition). When readers wrote objecting to Herman's point of view, he was delighted to clip their responses and add their contrary opinions to his binders.

Herman thrived on points and counterpoints. Decidedly partisan, he usually aimed his pen pricks at the GOP. He compared Donald Trump to Caligula. He dubbed US military involvement in Iraq and Afghanistan "The Bush War."


When Herman died on Nov. 17, 2018, the editor of the Santa Fe New Mexican wrote a column headlined: "Using his Pen, Herman I. Morris Made Us Think."

Herman's wife, Shirley, and his daughter, Ellen St. Clair, have bequeathed four binders of his Letters-To-The-Editor to the Fort Worth Jewish Archives. If you would like to look through his letters, stop by the Ahavath Sholom office and ask Cameron or Pattie to share the collection with you.



Was Alexander Hamilton Jewish?

Historian Andrew Porwancher debunks a string of myths about the origin of this founding father to arrive at the conclusion that Hamilton was likely born and raised Jewish.

Please join us for a special evening presentation on Monday, December 6th. Congregation Ahavath Sholom, Beth-El, Beth Israel, and Beth Shalom come together for a special community Zoom funded by the Jewish Federation of Fort Worth and Tarrant County.



Andrew Porwancher

Professor Porwancher, the Ernest May Fellow at Harvard and Wick Cary Associate Professor at the University of Oklahoma, will share why he believes Hamilton kept his Jewish upbringing in the Caribbean a secret when he moved to New York. His extensive research reveals important new information that upends the assumption that Hamilton was Christian.

By setting Hamilton in the context of his Jewish world, the author's fascinating new book, The Jewish World of Alexander Hamilton, challenges us to rethink the life and legend of America's most enigmatic founder, who championed the cause of both American and Jewish ideals. If you'd like to read the book before the Zoom, one copy is available to borrow from the CAS library or order from Amazon, Barnes & Noble, or Kindle.

The program starts promptly at 7:00 pm and will be preceded at 6:50 by an Alexander Hamilton trivia poll and our own Hazzan Jeffrey Weber singing Adon Olam to the tune of "You'll Be Back" from the Hamilton musical. During the Zoom presentation, the name of one person present online from CAS will be randomly drawn and receive a personally autographed copy of the book.

Joshua Nelson In Concert January 16, 2022

Joshua Nelson (pictured right) brings his extraordinary message of hope, unity, and spirituality through Kosher Gospel – a marriage of Jewish religious lyrics and meanings with the soulful sounds of



Gospel Music – to Fort Worth on January 14 & 16.

At age eight, Nelson discovered an album by Mahalia Jackson, the Queen of Gospel, in his grandparents' record collection and fell in love with her singing. During his teens and early twenties, he became widely celebrated as a gospel singer continuing Jackson's legacy. In addition, he is a full-time Hebrew teacher in the Hebrew school at Sharey Tefilo-Israel, a Reform synagogue in South Orange, NJ. While attending Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Nelson started blending Hebrew texts with the gospel melodies and arranging Jewish hymns in gospel style. Both of his parents are Jewish, and his family attended temple at a black synagogue in Brooklyn.

For his audiences, whatever their faith or heritage, Kosher Gospel has been a revelation. Now in his thirties, Mr. Nelson has performed around the world for Presidents, major music festivals, and Oprah. He has produced Kosher Gospel CDs like "Mi Chamocha," sung with stars from Aretha Franklin to the Klezmatics, and was the subject of a documentary aired on PBS.



THINK ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

According to the updated **CDC guidelines of August 13, 2021,** to maximize protection from the Delta variant and prevent possibly spreading it to others, wear a mask indoors in public if you are in an **area of substantial or high transmission**. 
