Bringing God and the Community Closer Together

FROM OUR RABBI

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As we approach Passover, I remember a story about David Ben Gurion. Ben Gurion was the first prime minister of the State of Israel, and he described through a metaphor the importance of the memories pre-

served on Pesach while at the same time arguing for the right to a Jewish State in 1947. He said, "Three hundred years ago, a ship called the Mayflower set sail to the New World. This was a great event in the history of England. Yet I wonder if there is one Englishman who knows at what time the ship set sail? Do the English know how many people embarked on this voyage? What quality of bread did they eat? Yet more than three thousand three hundred years ago, before the Mayflower set sail, the Jews left Egypt. Every Jew in the world, even in America or Soviet Russia, knows exactly what date they left (the fifteenth of the month of Nisan) and everyone knows what kind of bread (matzah) the Jews ate. Even today, the Jews worldwide eat matza on the 15th of Nisan. They retell the story of the Exodus and all the troubles Jews have endured since being exiled. They conclude this evening with two statements: 'This year, slaves. Next year, free men. This year here. Next year in Jerusalem, in Zion, in Eretz Yisrael. That is the nature of the Jews."

Based upon this story, we need to ask ourselves, what was Ben Gurion trying to teach the world through his metaphor? What was the moral of the story? In my view, the answer is Jews around the world are connected to their history; communally, religiously, and emotionally. We always remember important dates, especially those which have to do with redemption. We do this during the Passover Seder by retelling the story, plagues, etc.

One of the most obvious and symbolic ways we do this during the Seder is drinking the four cups of wine which symbolizes our redemption.

The four cups of wine at the Seder correspond to the four expressions of redemption mentioned in Exodus 6:6-7.

"Therefore, say to the children of Israel: 'I am the Lord, and I will bring you out.'" (V'hotzeti) - direct connection between God and Man. "From under the burdens of the Egyptians, and I will deliver you." (V'hitzalti) - direct remembrance of the story of Egypt.

 "From their bondage, and I will redeem you (V'ga'alti) with an outstretched arm and with great judgment."

refers to the 10 plagues.

• "And I will take you (V'lakachti) to Me for a people, and I will be you a God." - refers to the renewed covenant and the 10 commandments.

In essence, the four cups of wine that we drink at the Seder commemorate our past redemption. Now that we see the four cups remind us of our past, is there possibly another cup that alludes to our future? The answer to this is, Yes. This being, The cup of "Eliyahu." For it symbolizes our future and ultimate redemption with the coming of the Messiah. According to the tradition, Eliyahu HaNavi will be the one to inform us of the Messiah's arrival.

Now we know and understand what the cups refer to and sit down to celebrate the Chag; we can think back to our common past and reflect a little upon our actions. We prepare ourselves for redemption, for which we shall pray during the entirety of the holiday and the rest of the year.

On behalf of Michal, Daniel, Maya, Lia, Rocky, and myself, we wish everyone a Chag Kasher V'Samech (A Happy and Kosher Holiday).






