What are the most important factors in a movie? Is it the actors? The answer might be yes, for would Top Gun Maverick be as good without Tom Cruise? How about the directors? Once again, yes, they

might be the most important factors to the success of a movie. Would JFK have been so good without Oliver Stone as the director? How about the Special Effects of a movie? Once again, this answer is also a possibility, for would Harry Potter have been as successful as it was without the set it was filmed upon? Having asked this, I believe that the answers are parallel in many ways to the question; what makes Shavuot the most special of holidays? The holiday itself signifies the act of revelation (receiving of the Decalogue) at Mt. Sinai. Exodus 20:15 states, "all the people witnessed the thunder and lightning, the blare of the horn and the mountain smoking." In this description, we have God as the director, Moses as the star, and Mt. Sinai as the special effects. If this isn't powerful, I don't know what is.

To truly find amazement, let us look for a moment at the description in Exodus. Thunder is often intimidating, and most people are usually amazed and scared at the same time. Even more so, since we usually can hear thunder before we see lightning or any other type of rain or storm outside. From the description above, we can conclude that while not everyone saw the actual receiving of the Torah by Moses from God, they were all able to understand its power through the experience and the power of the thunder.

In terms of the awe of lightning, this comes to my mind from the ability to visibly see the power of electricity. We often feel and sense something all-powerful and unbridled in the sky that we cannot control. The sky itself is seen as the sole dominion of God. Furthermore, all those who might not have been able to hear the thunder were able to understand the power of the moment by seeing the lightning.

The blare of the horns and the shofar signifies the new month, the call to

prayer, and the high holy days. The sounds of the tekiah stir our souls and often wake us up to the things around us. These sounds signify the call to duty and our responsibility to accept the yoke of our religion and cultural ties. Finally, the smoking mountain is representative of God's fire that does not consume. This is very similar to the burning bush that Moses experienced. Here the Nation of Israel was part of the new brit between man and God that the Torah represented.

The holiday of Shavuot was and is the greatest nexus of God, man, and drama that ever took place and far outlasts the famous actors, directors, and sets of even the most classic of movies. Furthermore, our ability to hear, see and feel the messages of the Torah makes our celebration of Shavuot and every day following it even greater.

Instead of the Force Being With Us, May the Torah always be within and among us.

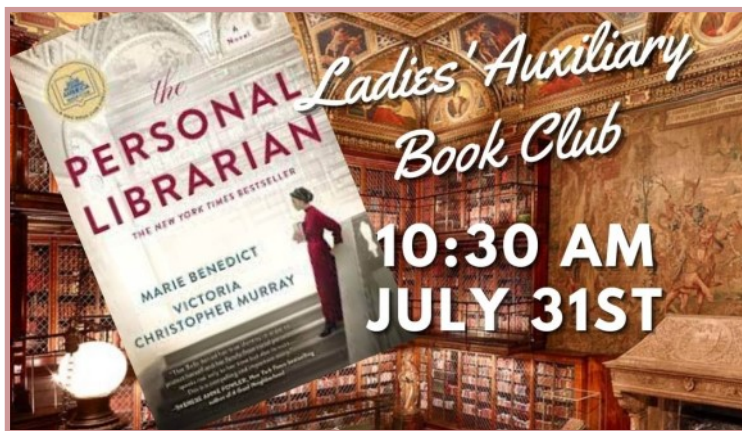
Sunday Funday and Spiritual Sundays By Rabbi Andrew Bloom

We are blessed to hold services daily here at the synagogue except for Sundays. However, this doesn't make Sunday any less holy or important. Within each service, we read a Psalm for the day, and on Sunday, it is Psalm 24. I hope the following explanation will allow us to fill our spirits at home on Sundays.

We find in the Talmud a statement attributed to Rabbi Aki-va that each Psalm reflects a day in the week of Creation (BT Rosh Hashanah 31a). Sunday's Psalm represents the first day of creation. Verse 1 of the Psalm we read says, "The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it."

According to the Talmud mentioned above, on the first day, He (God) took possession, gave possession, and was a ruler in His universe. In a parallel source (Genesis 1:1-5), the French Biblical Commentator, Rashi, explains that although He (God) gave possession of the physical world to mankind He (God) remained the ultimate ruler, not sharing authority with any other power.

What are this Psalm and subsequent message trying to teach us? I believe that it has to do with new beginnings, specifically the beginning of the week. It reminds us that God is not only the creator of the world, but He also laid upon us the responsibility of keeping His creation alive and dynamic in the coming week. We are given His holy "possession" to tend and tiller. Thus, as we begin this week, let us be stewards of ourselves and the world around us. Helping the world fulfill its purpose that God created it for on the first day of creation.

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WHAT IS TISHA B'AV?

What is Tisha B'Av, where do we find it within our sources, and what can we learn from this somber and mournful fast day? To answer this question, we must first look at the sources whereby they can be found. The source coming from the Mishna, Ta'anit 4:6 reads,

חמשה דברים ארעו את אבותינו בשבעה עשר בתמוז וחמשה בתשעה באב. בשבעה עשר בתמוז נשתברו הלוחות, ובטל התמיד, והבקעה העיר, ושרף אפוסטמוס את התורה, והעמיד צלם בהיכל. בתשעה באב נגזר על אבותינו שלא יקנסו לארץ, וחרב הבית בראשונה ובשניה, ונלכדה ביתר, ונחרשה העיר. משנכנס אב, ממעטין בשמחה:

According to the Mishna above, on Tisha B'Av we mourn five main tragedies that befell the Jewish people on this date:

- The Sin of the Spies occurred, as told in Numbers (Bamidbar) 13. As detailed in the Biblical story of the spies, the spies returned from scouting out the Land of Israel with a negative report, which resulted in them wandering in the desert for forty years instead of going straight into the land.
- On this day, the destruction of the First Temple occurred, in 586 BCE, by the Babylonians, led by General Nebuchadnezzar. The Babylonian Exile lasted for the next 70 years.
- The destruction of the Second Temple occurred on this day, in 70 CE, by the Romans, led by Emperor Titus. Exile followed, and Jews dispersed throughout the world.
- On this day, the Temple Mount was plowed over and rebuilt as a pagan city, Aelia Capitolina, by the Romans in the year 135 CE, led by General Turnus Rufus.
- On this day in the year 136 CE, the Bar Kochba revolt (which had fought against the Roman overtaking of Jerusalem in the years following the destruction of the Second Temple) was finally crushed. The last Jewish stronghold, Beitar, was destroyed, which resulted in the killing of thousands of Jews.

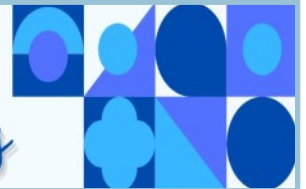
In addition to these ancient tragedies, more modern ones also occurred on Tisha B'Av. Himmler presented his plan to the Nazi Party on the "Final Solution" to the Jewish problem on July 31, 1940 (Tisha B'Av). One year later, to the day, Himmler's "plan" was implemented. One year after that, the Nazi deportation of Jews began from the Warsaw Ghetto in 1942.

As we can see, the marking of Tisha B'Av is central to our understanding of "Never Again." It must be in the front of

our minds and at the core of our actions. Without this, Tisha B'Av may not only be a remembrance of what was, but also a forebearer of what might come in the future.
