April was a very busy month for the LEC students, filled with holidays, memorial days, activities, and special LEC family weekends.

On April 2nd the LEC students started their day at school making Charoset for the mock Seder and to share with their families. Later in the day, we illustrated to the kids the experience of the Exodus out of Egypt.

A mock seder is a great way to involve all the students in preparation for Passover. It allows everyone to become familiar with the seder's structure and the various components of the meal. Additionally, it can be an excellent opportunity for students to discuss the holiday's meaning and what it represents.

In addition to the mock seder, another important aspect of Jewish history this month is the Holocaust memorial. The Holocaust Museum in Dallas provides a poignant reminder of the atrocities committed against the Jewish people during World War II. Visiting the museum was a powerful experience that allows individuals to gain a deeper understanding of the Holocaust's impact on the Jewish people and the world at large.

Across the globe, antisemitism is on the rise; I first experienced it as a 6th grader, just like you. And although I hope you never experience it in your lifetime, someway, somehow...you will. You will experience hate and intolerance, neither of which have any place in a civilized world. And yet they persist. Many of you may choose to be silent on matters of antisemitism and racism during your journey into adulthood. It certainly may seem easier. But evil only grows when we do not speak out against it. Each of you, and all of you, have an important role to play.

I am reminded of a poem written by Pastor Martin Niemoller who wrote the statement "First they came...."

It goes like this:

First, they came for the Socialists, and I did not speak out-

Because I was not a Socialist.

Then they came for the Trade Unionists, and I did not speak out-

Because I was not a Trade Unionist.

Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out-

Because I was not a Jew.

Then they came for me—and there was no one left to speak for me.

When World War II ended, and when millions of Jews (and many others) were exterminated in mass genocide, many people, including my grandfather, promised to Never Forget.

When September 11th happened, the heroes performed myriad acts of bravery, and once the rubble was cleared, many people in my generation promised to Never Forget.

Today, we must all promise to Never Forget what it means to be decent human beings. Our resolve must be stronger than steel...because without it, we are at the mercy of forces that might seek to do us harm, and if not us, then those we know, those we love. Freedom is not free. Peace is not guaranteed. And life, liberty, and the

(May Recipe From Maria) Firecracker Grilled Alaskan Salmon

- 8 (4 ounze) salmon fillets 1/2 cup peanut oil
- 4 tbsp. each : balsamic vinegar, soy sauce and
- chopped green onions
- 3 tsp. brown sugar
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 1/2 tsp ground ginger
- 2 tsp. crushed red pepper flakes
- 1 tsp. sesame oil
- 1/2 tsp. salt

Place salmon fillets in a medium, nonporous glass dish. In a separate medium bowl, combine all the other ingredients. Whisk together well, and pour over the fish. Cover

and marinate the fish in the refrigerator for 4 to 6 hours.

Prepare an outdoor grill with coals about 5 inches from the grate, and lightly oil the grate. Grill the fillets 5 inches from the coals for 10 minutesper inch of thickness, measured at the

thickest part, or until fish just flakes with a fork. Turn over halfway through cooking. Serves 8.
